The book said that a "hot bath" for the baby should be from 100 to 110 degrees, a "warm bath" from 90 to 100 degrees, and a "tepid bath" slightly below 90 degrees.

Hence Judge Prendergast decided that the water in the apartment house was not legally "hot," and that Levy therefore had had the right to break the lease.

FARMERS ASK REASON FOR HIGH COST OF LIVING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Farmers are impatient with a situation that compels them to pay prices from 50 to 150 per cent higher than before the war, according to A. Sykes of Iowa, who is attending the national agricultural conference. Sykes has figured out how many bushels of corn it takes to buy some of the things a farmer needs.

"Why is it," he asked, "that farmers have to pay 400 bushels of corn for a wagon which they used to buy for 150 bushels?"

"Why must they pay 250 bushels of corn for a gangplow which formerly cost 125 bushels, or 150 bushels for a suit of clothes that formerly cost 75 bushels, or 25 bushels for shoes that formerly cost nine bushels?"

Farmers in the corn belt also want to know, he said, why hant is sold at retail throughout the country at



about six times the price of live hogs, when the normal rate is 1 to 2 1/2.
