Good Boxing Card At Oakland Feb. 4.

Considerable interest is being shown in the boxing match to be held at Oakland on Saturday February 4th. The commission there has arranged a good card and a large number of local fans are expecting to be in attendance. The main event will be Charlie Dawson, who is boxing instructor at University and at the Eugene Y. M. C. A., and has been in the boxing game since 1913 and during this time he has engaged in one hundred and nine ring encounters and has won 94 of these. Twelve of these by the knockout route. During the war while he was in the navy he appeared in 18 bouts for the benefit of the American Red Cross and other welfare organizations. In the early part of 1919 he beat the light weight champion of the navy of Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, in four rounds. In October 1918 he beat Red Calahan of Chicago in a 10 round bout at the Brooklyn Athletic club in Brooklyn, N. Y. August, 1919, he won a decision over Jack Hennessey of Australia in 18 rounds at Panama City, Panama. His last bout he lost a 6 round decision to Freddie Anderson of Vancouver in the semi-final bout of the Wells-Tate affair at Milwaukee arena on New Years.

Carl Miller, who is to meet Dawson in the main event is one of the most rugged boys developed in this part of the country. He packs a dangerous wallop and is noted for his ability to mix it and give and take heavy punishment. He has the advantage of a longer reach and a slight weight difference. From outside observations it would seem that Dawson would be foolish to try and out-fight Miller. It is likely that he will try and win by fast and clever work. On the other hand Miller is sure to bore in and force matters. It looks like an interesting session is due.

The semi-final event will be a fight pure and simple by Barney Miller, who by the way is no relation to Carl, and who is slated to tangle

with Pete Jensen in another six round event. This bout will in all probability end in a draw for one of the boys. They are middleweights and the odds are even.

The four round event between Jack Terry of San Diego and Jose Rivers of Eugene will be a bout well worth watching as both boys are fast and clever.

MEDFORD, Jan. 26.—A small sized crowd, considering the attraction, witnessed the Hand-Reuben wrestling match at Gold Hill last night, which resulted in a victory for Hand, two falls to one. The match was one of the best seen in this section for some time and was a clean and sportsmanlike contest from start to finish.

Hand's weight was announced as 163 pounds and Reuben's as 155. The contestants climbed into the ring and from the time they came from their corners until the first fall held the crowd tense with interest. During the first part of the match Gold Hill's pride apparently held the advantage on points, placing Reuben in numerous dangerous positions. Reuben, however, displayed his knowledge of the game and extricated himself with remarkable skill from many hard places. Reuben secured a crotch-toe hold and won the first fall in 42 minutes.

Twelve minutes after the contestants had again entered the ring Hand secured a damaging hammerlock on Reuben and secured the second fall. The match by this time was gaining speed and became more spectacular. One of Reuben's fingers was badly injured during the application of the hammerlock.

The contestants again entered the ring and the grappling again became fast and spectacular with no advantage apparent on either side until Hand saw his advantage and secured Thye's famous arm-lock on Reuben, giving him his second fall after four minutes of wrestling.
