ENGLE, Jan. 27.—Reedsport is again busy and an air of optimism prevails, according to L. T. Sparks, district freight and passenger agent, who returned from a visit to the Coos Bay section yesterday. The Winchester bay mill is operating and loading two large barges of lumber which are shipped to San Pedro, Cal-

ifornia. One barge is loaded while the other makes the trip.

The Johnson mill has been working full blast for some time on a large paper pulp order. The Reedsport saw and door factory is filling orders for a large shipment of garage doors for the eastern trade while the box factory is also operating.

A new highway up the Umpqua river from Reedsport to Scottsburg,

17 1/2 miles, has been started. This will connect Reedsport with Roseburg, the county seat, as well as serve a farming section. A portion of the road will also be most scenic, according to Mr. Sparks.
