R. H. S. TO PLAY THREE GAMES

Exciting Contests Scheduled For the Coming Week and Fans Delighted.

TRIPS ARE PLANNED

Medford, Ashland and Albany to Play Here During Coming Week and On Following Two Weeks
Local H. S. Will Travel

Roseburg basketball fans are looking forward to a very interesting season this week. On Friday the Roseburg boys meet the Medford high school team here and on Saturday night, the Albany high school team will play here. Medford is considered one of the strongest teams in Southern Oregon and is one of the chief contenders for the southern Oregon championship. Medford has defeated the strong Ashland team and is coming to Roseburg confident of being able to win from the local players.

Saturday night's game with the Albany high school will also be a fast exhibition of basketball. The Albany boys have one of the strong teams of the Willamette Valley, and have been winning some decisive victories in that section of the state. Both of these games will be preceded by interesting preliminary contests.

On Wednesday, Feb. 15, the Ashland high school plays here. This will be a game for blood as Ashland and Roseburg have been rivals for years and the hardest fought games of the season are nearly always played between these two teams.

The rivalry dates back for many years when Ashland and Roseburg were practically the only two towns in southern Oregon maintaining strong basketball teams and both fought hard to win the honors of the southern Oregon championship. Last year Ashland wrested these honors from Roseburg and this year the local boys are expecting to stage an exciting comeback.

The local girls team goes to Grants Pass on Friday to play the girls at that place.

On Friday, Feb. 17, Roseburg starts its northern trip and will play Cottage Grove and Albany, and on the following week will go south to meet Medford and Ashland. The two games this week and the contest next Wednesday will be the only chances local fans will have of witnessing fast basketball for several weeks and consequently it is expected that there will be a good attendance.

The local team is the fastest the Roseburg high school has produced for a great many years. Although light the team is dazzling fast, in fact it may be said to be too speedy for its own good. So far no opponents have been able to check the speed of the local basket tossers who have displayed an uncanny ability to pass the ball down the floor into the

territory of their opponents.

The fact that the locals have had no hard battles is a factor against them as they are apt to become over-confident. They have won all of their contests up to the present time easily and are inclined to become too sure of themselves which fact is apt to bring defeat where in all reality they should win. The Roseburg high school is determined this year to win the state championship in the state tournament and is anxious to have the support of all of the residents of the community in continuing their athletic endeavors.

HAS PADDOCK JINXED RIVAL?

STANFORD UNIV., Cal., Feb. 8.—(United Press.)—Sportsmen have argued pro and con for several years as to whether Charlie Paddock, world champion sprinter, had his nearest rival, Morris Kirksey, "jinxed."

On form, on potential ability, and on his fast records, Kirksey by all rights should be a better man than Paddock. But in every race where the two have run together, Kirksey has shown signs of exhibiting "nerves" at the pudgey U. S. C. man's dodgy tactics, and has generally come in just a nose behind. Usually in the hundred Kirksey has broken his stride within eight or ten yards of the tape.

Whether this "jinx" is the case or not, Kirksey will have a chance to determine during the coming season.

Paddock has decided to rest of his laurels, without endangering his reputation or risking losing any of the records he holds. He has decided to pursue the journalistic game instead of using his legs in other ways.

With Paddock on the list of retired admirals, Kirksey now becomes the top sprinter of the country.

Many who know Morris and his temperamental qualities profess to believe that this season will be his most brilliant one, now that his "jinx" opponent with his wood-knocking habits and false starts is off the track for good.

Anyway, Kirksey now has a real chance to show what he can do. And Paddock has hung up a number of records for him to shoot at. Incidentally, it might be remarked that Paddock and Kirksey are the closest friends.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE MADRONE AVENUE.

Notice is hereby given: That at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 6th day of February, 1922, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve Madrone Avenue from the north line of Mill Street to the north line of Lagoon Street in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-four feet wide with concrete pavement.

Third: By constructing concrete curbs.

Fourth: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary.

Fifth: By constructing street monuments.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary.

Seventh: By constructing catch-basins and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 6th day of February, 1922, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including engineering, interest, and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimates of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$249.25.

Resolved, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of said City, which is the 5th day of February, 1922.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Sealed bids will be received by the County Clerk of Douglas County, Oregon, at the courthouse in Roseburg, Oregon, at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 2nd day of March, 1922, for construction work on a section of road between Edenhower and Umpqua post office, known as the Edenhower Section. The work involves approximately 1 mile of grading and alternate bids on 1 mile of Concrete Pavement or 2 types of litholithic pavement, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng Sta 0+00 to the Pacific Highway; thence westerly to Eng Sta 2+00.

Also construction work on a section of road between Edenhower and Umpqua post office, known as the Bacon Section. The work involves approximately 2 miles of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng Sta 0+00 to Eng Sta 2+00; thence westerly thru Secs. 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10, to Eng Sta 10+00.

Also construction work on a section of road between Yoncalla and Elkhead P. O., known as Milltown Hill. The work involves approximately 1 1/2 miles of grading and graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Eng Sta 0+00 to Eng Sta 1+00; thence southerly thru Secs. 4, 6, 8 and 10, to Eng Sta 4+00.

Also construction work on a section of road between Roseburg and Coles Valley, known as the Cleveland Culvert Section. The work involves the construction of a 6x6x24 inch concrete culvert at the Cleveland P. O.

Also construction on a section of road between Glendale and Marvin Hill, known as Oakland Culvert Section. The work involves construction of a 24x36x40 inch Whalen Concrete Culvert and backfill 1/2 mile west of the city of Oakland, Oregon.

Contractors may bid on grading and graveling separately.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by cash, bidder's bond or certified check for an amount equal to at least five (5) per cent of the total amount of the bid.

A sufficient bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in a sum equal to one-half the total amount of the bid.

Plans, specifications, forms of contract, proposals, blanks and full information for bidders may be obtained at the office of the county clerk or the county roadmaster, courthouse, Roseburg, Oregon, upon the deposit of five dollars.

The right is reserved to reject any or all proposals, or to accept the proposal or proposals deemed best for the county.

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
