WIVES ASK MAYOR TO SHIELD THEIR HUSBANDS FROM WIVES OF SEA VAMPIRES

PURITY LEAGUE OF FLORIDA RESORT IS INCENSED AT THE BREVITY OF MAID'S ATTIRE.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 8.—If the Purify League of this city has its way fair bathers who sport in the waters of Tampa bay and the Gulf of Mexico will be compelled to wear long sleeves, skirts and stockings while on the beaches.

An appeal has been made to Frank P. Pulver, multi-millionaire mayor of St. Petersburg, by the league in the form of a letter urging him to take action.

Pulver is asked to appoint a bathing suit inspector and is further informed that Annette Kellerman suits must be done away with so that the "married men in the Purify League will be protected from the wives of the sea vamps."

Mayor Promises Inspection.

While expressing doubt whether there was any law in the city stat-

utes that would give him power to say what should be worn by the fair bathers, Pulver said he would make several inspections of the beaches and learn first hand whether the protest is justified or not.

Pulver is a bachelor. The letter to the mayor, signed by Hazel Winford Van Freedom, secretary of the St. Petersburg Purify League, follows:

"The attention of this organization, the Purify League, has been called to the outrageous bathing suits worn on the beaches around St. Petersburg. Abreviated to an extreme, skirtless and sleeveless, young women in reckless abandon appear before young men and their elders in costumes that never would be tolerated in Christian communities."

"Make Them Wear Sleeves."

"Mr. Mayor Pulver, it is up to you to take some action on these bathing suits. You must compel the young ladies to wear stockings and

skirts to their suits. You must wear sleeves. As it is now, these girls don't care how they look on the beaches. They are naked."

"Further, this league with the married men in its number, if it has to engage its own forces. Members of the league have gone on record opposing the present costume worn on the bathing beaches. We further urge you, Mayor Pulver, do away with the suits and a certain Annette Kellerman, back to us the modest ladies, and take away the shameless young police permit the young men of this community to wear the men and our husbands."

"Pressure is now being brought with the state legislature to compel restrictions on the dress of bathing suits. We are urging the appointment of a bathing suit inspector for all beaches."
