OUR BOY SCOUTS.

Thursday of this week, Feb. 8, was the twelfth birthday of the Boy Scouts of America. Twelve years ago only an idea, today this fine organization of young American boyhood has marshalled 84,000 men into voluntary service and 403,152 boys are applying themselves to a definite program.

Every city in the United States of any importance has its local organization of Boy Scouts. Roseburg is among them, with a mighty fine set of young fellows who are earnestly applying themselves to the principles, objects and teachings of this truly American organization which is instilling in the minds of young America pure and wholesome thoughts to bring about a higher standard of efficiency as these youngsters mature into manhood.

As a matter of information for those who are not in close touch with the general principles of the Boy Scout organization, the following "Scout Laws," to which each member pledges his honor, is herewith produced in full and as follows:

1. A Scout is trustworthy. A Scout's honor is to be trusted. If he were to violate his honor by telling a lie, or by cheating, or by not doing exactly a given task, when trusted on his honor, he may be directed to hand over his scout badge.
2. A Scout is Loyal. He is loyal to all to whom loyalty is due; his scout leader, his home, and parents and country.
3. A Scout is Helpful. He must be prepared at any time to save life, help injured persons, and share the home duties. He must do at least one good turn to somebody every day.
4. A Scout is Friendly. He is a friend to all, and a brother to every other Scout.
5. A Scout is Courageous. He is polite to all, especially to women, children, old people, and the weak and helpless. He must not take pay for being helpful or courteous.
6. A Scout is Kind. He is a friend to animals. He will not kill nor hurt any living creature needlessly, but will strive to save and protect all harmless life.
7. A Scout is Obedient. He obeys his parents, scoutmaster, patrol leader, and all other duly constituted authorities.
8. A Scout is Cheerful. He smiles whenever he can. His obedience to orders is prompt and cheery. He never shirks nor grumbles at hardships.
9. A Scout is Thrifty. He does not wantonly destroy property. He works faithfully, wastes nothing, and makes the best use of his opportunities. He saves his money so that he may pay his own way, be generous to those in need, and helpful to worthy objects. He may work for pay but must not receive tips for courteous or good turns.
10. A Scout is Brave. He has the courage to face danger in spite of fear and to stand up for the right against the coaxings of friends or the jeers or threats of enemies; defeat does not down him.
11. A Scout is Clean. He keeps clean in body and thought, stands for clean speech, clean sport, clean habits, and travels with a clean crowd.
12. A Scout is Reverent. He is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion.

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Circuit Court Starts Feb. 20

The February term of Circuit Court will start on February 20 and will probably last well into the middle of the month of March. The preliminary term starts on the 16th, that being the date set by Judge Hamilton for calling the docket. Cases will be set for trial, and the disposition of others decided upon. Between the 16th and 20th, Judge Hamilton will hear motions, demurrers, etc., and several cases will probably be brought to an issue during that time. The criminal docket is quite long and the court will undoubtedly start hearing these cases first. W. H. Levine, accused of assault with a dangerous weapon is under indictment and John Friend is also indicted on a charge of assault and battery. These cases will probably be disposed of first. The grand jury convenes on the 20th and will probably return several indictments within a few days so that there will be little delay in disposing of the criminal cases.

In the event the grand jury returns an indictment against C. M. Young, accused of killing Douglas Tapp, this will probably be the longest case to be heard in court. Another case which will attract much attention will be the appeals of several property owners of the Ten Mile district who are endeavoring to obtain larger sums for right of way than have been allowed by the county court in appropriating land for the route of the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway. Judge Hamilton has designated Friday, Feb. 24th as Naturalization Day and applications for that papers will be heard at that time.

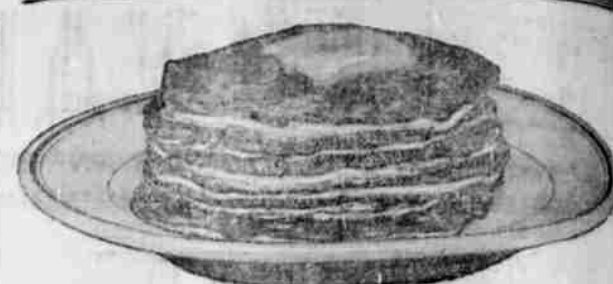

Europe Sees The Senate as Bogey of World

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The poor old United States senate, battered and buffeted about by the American public, stands out in Europe as the sinister "bogey man" of old world statesmen.

Fresh from the United States, where the dignified senate is not always regarded with the greatest of reverence, one finds himself confronted in Europe with an entirely different view of this "greatest deliberative body in the world."

In Europe the United States senate is looked upon as a barrier to many of the hopes of the European statesmen.

Apparently Europe cannot forget the League of Nations debacle, when the statesmen of the Old World thought they had succeeded in concocting a diplomatic pill for the international malady of "too much war," only to find that an unconsulted member of the international association of doctors threw the "pill" out of the window.

Europe is not hopeful. Europe doesn't place much faith in future aid from the United States, according to the general impression one gets in political and diplomatic circles. There is no lack of faith in American leaders, but there is a decided disposition to incline to the belief that the United States senate is prepared to block any move initiated for European relief which calls for American participation.

Europe and the Europeans press pay attention to the United States senate, and the statements of senators, speeches in the senate, which are passed by American newspapers as simply "mere oratory," yet pronounced in the European press, and mentioned in the European statesmen's conversations that are regarded in the United States as the sort of talk which is expected from senators and congressmen.

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repe wants the United States senate on their side, but they will never be sure of the position of the American government in the future, for the have dire fears of the senate as credit it with being the most potent organization in parliamentary history.
