Roseburg to Play Ashland Wednesday

Boys of the Ashland high school will meet the local high school at 7:30 Wednesday evening. This will be the last chance to see them in action, until the latter part of the season, as they will be leaving the next two weeks. The Ashland high school has gone to the season so far without a loss and the "dope" gives them the strongest opponents that the boys will have to face. By the time Friday and Saturday nights' game can be seen that Roseburg has the strongest team for the season and has not suffered a loss. Roseburg has met all the strongest of the southern part of the state except Ashland. If Roseburg wins this game it will give them the lead in the state finals for championship, which will be in Salem sometime in March. Every man on the team now is in the best physical condition and know they have a hard game to play when they meet Ashland. The game will be the most thrilling of the season so everyone should go to back the team and see them.

Roseburg Wins From Albany

An exciting but one-sided game of basketball Saturday night, the Ashland high school defeated Albany high school by a score of 41 to 17. Albany was completely out of sync and Roseburg's hard luck shooting baskets the score would have been much larger in favor of Albany while practically all of Albany's scores came on "horseshoe" shots.

"Dad" King has produced the best high school teams developed in this city. Although Albany is light it is marvelously fast, much faster than any team before representing the school. Albany in the last two games, however, has shown a weakness in shooting baskets which is apt to be a considerable drawback in hard fought games.

After three shots were missed Albany should have quite a few more shots. Many occasions when the Albany team should have scored. This was due somewhat to carelessness in Albany in neither of the last two games was the team forced to shoot itself. The Roseburg five played and at times displayed a tendency to loaf.

There is no disputing the fact that Albany's defense is perfect. Time after time Albany took the ball in Albany territory and tried to reach Roseburg basket, but so perfect was the Roseburg defense system that it was very seldom that a man could break through with the ball. Albany was completely bewildered by Roseburg system of defense and efforts of her team to draw off Roseburg players oftentimes resulted in huddles.

The game was witnessed by a crowd which completely filled the gymnasium and many comments and questions for the Roseburg team were heard. There is no question but that the Roseburg high school is better represented this year than for any years and if the team can show some equal to its defense against Albany, the local school has a sure chance for the state championship.

Shooting was the weakest, but in the second half the forwards appeared to regain their shooting eye and the baskets fell with almost clock-like precision.

During the game an announcement that the Roseburg girls had defeated Grants Pass, at Grants Pass, by a score of 16 to 15, caused wild excitement.

The contest was refereed by Eddie Durno of the University of Oregon and there was little criticism of his work. He requires clean, sportsman-like playing and keeps the game moving rapidly. He is an excellent referee and won the approval not only of the fans but of the players themselves by his fair dealing.

The high school orchestra gave several selections during the evening and each number was well received. Roseburg's hardest game will probably come Wednesday night when Ashland plays here. Years of rivalry between the two schools adds to the determination of both teams. Ashland is composed of five husky young men who outweigh the local players by a considerable amount. Ashland also has a forward who shows an uncanny ability at converting the long shots. This is, without doubt, to be one of the finest basketball games of the season and the score will very probably be quite close.

Saturday's game was preceded by a preliminary between Company D, of the local National Guard and H. D. The game was won by the Guard team by a score of 29 to 6.

Photographs Reveal Much of Rugged Personality.

Present Generation Need Not, as in the Case of Washington, Look for Character in Portraits.

Abraham Lincoln remains, and will remain, one of the most important possessions of the common people everywhere, partly because his rugged personality is so difficult for either writers or sculptors to standardize. Fortunate it is for us that he lived in an age of photography—although no sensitized plate can reveal the entire mystery, the camera does not lie. We are not compelled to flounder hopelessly, comparing different portraits by different painters, as all must who make the vain endeavor to get before the eyes of their minds what George Washington was like. The Lincoln who looks out from the pictures that have come down to us was caught in moments for which no solicitous friends had the opportunity to see that his clothes were pressed or that every stray lock of hair was plastered down. And so in his likeness we get something which has the virtue of being really "like."

In the National capital there is a Greek temple of marble, in Potomac park. It is windowless, surrounded by Doric columns, and is the Lincoln memorial. But this temple does not close.

suggest the great human figure, whose acquaintance many have found. Justice to the great who have passed on is not the issue, since the present need is justice to the living. The firmament of human history is dotted thick with guiding stars, but they are oh, so very far away!

Heroes on a pedestal serve the present almost as little as ashes in an urn. The trouble is not that they lacked human nature, but that those who look for help are repelled by the cold marble which has been placed about them.

The greater lesson of Lincoln, the man of all the world, is that he is a magnificent illustration of what may be found, if only people will tear away the husks with which the kernel of truth is surrounded. The wrappings meet the eye and discourage the seeker, who must get beyond them in order personally to discover the spirit which gives life.

The tomb is not the man. This is the key to the secrets of history.

1921 License Tag No Longer Legal

Motor vehicle owners who are still flaunting a green license plate of the vintage of 1921 on their automobiles or trucks are now subject to arrest and fine under the provisions of the state traffic law.

The automobile registration department, having cleared its desks of the mass of applications which flooded the department the first of the year, Secretary of State Kozar Thursday notified peace officers throughout the state that there was no longer any valid excuse for the use of an old license on a motor vehicle.

Approximately 75,500 of the new license plates have been issued up to this time, as against 75,500 for the same date a year ago. By the reason of the radical change in the basis of the license fee from the horsepower and total tire width of trucks, much confusion has resulted, necessitating the return of from 20 to 25 per cent of all applications received and a consequent slowing down of the operation of the registration department.

GOES BACK TO OLD EGYPT

Legend of Cinderella, Almost Unlabeled, Believed to Have Come From Ancient Memphis.

Cinderella and the legend surrounding her glass slipper is believed to have originally come from ancient Memphis. In the ruins of this buried city lies the pyramid of Rhodoptis, who lived at Naucratis, and was incomparably beautiful and chaste. One day when Rhodoptis was bathing an eagle flew through the open ceiling of her bathroom and plucked from her maid's hands the sandal which she was just about to lace about her mistress' foot.

The eagle then flew to Memphis, where the king was administering justice in one of the courts of the palace, and, hovering above the king, dropped the sandal, which fell into the folds of the king's garment. He examined the sandal and found it so small and lovely that he bade his servants search all Egypt till they should find the woman whom it would fit.

Rhodoptis was found in Naucratis and carried to the king, who married her. She died after a few months' happiness, and the disconsolate king and one of the costliest pyramids of antiquity built in her memory. In the first century B. C. the priests of Memphis were wont to exhibit a sandal in a crystal shrine which, they declared, once belonged to Rhodoptis, miraculously preserved through many centuries. The sarcophagus and the mummy of Rhodoptis have entirely vanished and her pyramid is little more than a ruin, but her legend lives in every land.

FAMOUS "LION OF LUCERNE"

Thorvaldsen's Masterpiece Commemorates the Heroism of the Swiss Guards in Paris in 1792.

The well-known monument called the "Lion of Lucerne," erected near Lucerne, in 1821, commemorates the tragic fate of the Swiss guards in the French Revolution when in their devotion to duty they were sacrificed to the bullets of the Marstonis and the pikes of the mob, August 10, 1792.

This infantry regiment, the "Gardes Suisses," had been originally a Swiss mercenary regiment in the Wars of Religion; but for their own good conduct at the combat of Arques they were incorporated in the permanent establishment of the Maison de Roi, by Henry IV, (Henry of Navarre), in 1580, and in the guards in 1615. The French guards sided openly with the constitutional movement at the Revolution, and were disbanded, but the Swiss guards remained faithful to their trust.

This monument was the work of Bertel Thorvaldsen (1770-1844), a Danish sculptor, noted for his statues of Christ and the apostles, and for his efforts at classical sculpture. He was the son of an Icelandic who had settled in Denmark, and was born at Copenhagen. There he lies buried under a bed of roses in the courtyard of the museum he endowed.
