

CIRCUIT COURT CONVENES TODAY

Grand Jury Chosen and Starts Investigation Into Murder Douglas Tapp.

WOMEN ON THE JURY

Mrs. Adella Hadley Has Distinction of Being the First Woman Juror Chosen in Douglas County— Damage Suit Started.

Circuit court met this morning and the opening routine was gone through before court adjourned while the officials adjourned to attend the funeral of George Neuner, Sr., father of the district attorney. The grand jury was drawn and was composed of W. C. Harding, E. Bond, Wm. H. Bowder, John M. Davidson, Vincent Laflant, George A. Russell and C. T. Grubb. Mr. Grubb was later excused because of illness and Lewis G. Leonard was called to take his place.

The court convened again at 2 o'clock at which time the grand jury reported for duty and retired to commence its investigations. District Attorney Neuner stated that the grand jury will first take up the case of C. M. Young, charged with the murder of Douglas Tapp. Young and Tapp engaged in a quarrel at the Walker Freyer cabin in the hills near Elkton. Tapp, it is said, was very drunk and quarrelsome and Young states that Tapp threatened and started to kill him and fired one shot. In a hand to hand fight, Young secured his gun and shot Tapp in the head. He is charged with first degree murder. The investigation of this case will probably take two days.

The circuit court jury was called for the case of W. M. Salton against A. G. Kufner. This is an action for money growing out of a contract for lumber. Attorneys Biss and O'Leary appear for the defendant and O'Leary appears for the plaintiff and Rhodes for the plaintiff.

also chosen for this jury being the second juror called. Lawyers evidenced some hesitancy in their manner of addressing the jury but soon had "Ladies and Gentlemen of the Jury" rolling off the tongues quite easily.

Still Turned Over To Sheriff Starmer

A regulation copper water still, the one found near the Freyer cabin a short distance from Elkton, and the still in which Douglas Tapp is supposed to have brewed the moonshine upon which he became drunk and engaged in the quarrel with C. M. Young, which ended with the forfeiture of his life, was brought to this city today and turned over to Sheriff Starmer.

The still is of copper and is the kind generally used in distilling water to make it pure. The coil was also of copper and the plant was capable of manufacturing a very good grade of moonshine. It was found by Deputy Sheriff Rydell a short distance from the Freyer cabin after a long search.

It is claimed that before Tapp was killed he had produced a gallon jug of moonshine which he is believed to have made in the still that was brought here. The jug and the remaining portion of its contents were later found in the Freyer cabin and the officers will probably place a charge against Wallace Freyer of having intoxicated liquor in his possession.

The report was quickly discovered and a theft was made by Sheriff Starmer who at once got in touch with his deputies with the result that the boys were captured when they stopped at Myrtle Creek for gasoline. When returned to this city they admitted the charge. The boys are being held up while the officers communicate with Portland authorities.


