TRY TO ARREST TACOMA BANKER

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21.—Efforts to arrest Jafet Lindeberg, Tacoma banker, and rush him across the state line on a warrant issued after extradition, were frustrated this morning. Governor Stephens issued the warrant, returnable today. Deputy District Attorney Houdabush of Pierce county, Washington, planned to arrest Lindeberg, wanted in Tacoma on a charge of defrauding depositors and stockholders of the Scandinavian bank to prevent habeas corpus proceedings delaying extradition. Lindeberg is in bed with a physician's certificate saying that he could not be moved. The warrant was served but habeas corpus proceedings may be immediately instituted.

Several thousand copies are to be printed in folder form and will be explained and augmented by a great deal of interesting information. There will be descriptive articles dealing with camps and interesting spots throughout the forest. Will give rates for camps, together with tables of distances and interesting matter pertaining to forests. The folders will be ready soon for free distribution to the interested public.

Work Starts on Boswell Springs

EUGENE, Feb. 21.—Construction work on the new bottling works of the Sunset Mineral Springs company, near Drain, will be started as soon as weather permits, according to G. A. Wilson, manager of the concern, who was here yesterday in the interests of the new project which has taken over the property of the Boswell springs. The bottling works will cost approximately \$15,000, states the manager, who says that 20,000 feet of lumber are now on the ground in preparation for the work. A total of 61 acres of land is controlled by the company, the property being crossed by the main line of the Southern Pacific and the state highway. Elk creek also crosses the holdings of the concern for a distance of three-quarters of a mile. The springs are between Yoncalla and Drain and the stretch of town will be paved next month, according to the manager, who states that the contracts for the work have been let and that work will start March 17.

A 25-room hotel and bathhouse will be ready to be opened May 1 as the first unit in the extensive plans of the management which, with future buildings will aggregate an investment of \$300,000. It is hoped by the management of the project to have the entire plant including a 150-room hotel and a building on the Southern Pacific line completed before the opening of the Portland fair in 1925.

CONTROL AUTO CAMPS DISCUSSED

The Representatives of Cities Throughout State Favor Charge For Grounds.

A meeting was held in the city hall today for the purpose of preparing a uniform plan for the control and operation of the auto tourist camp grounds now being established by practically every city in the state. The meeting was called recently by the Roseburg city council and delegates were present from eight of the larger cities of the state. The cities represented were Portland, Salem, Ashland, Medford, Albany, Grants Pass, Oregon City and Roseburg. Because of the illness of Mayor Hamilton, the meeting was called to order by Dr. A. C. Seely, who explained the purpose of the gathering. S. C. Pier, park commissioner of Portland was elected permanent chairman and took charge of the meeting. He related experiences in handling parks and stated that in his opinion some means of regulation should be provided and a charge made. Talks were made by A. C. Seely of Roseburg, H. O. Probach of Medford, Councilmen Nichols, Brunn and Powell of Roseburg, W. S. Richards of Albany, Councilman Kohlhaugen of Roseburg, H. O. Barrett of Albany, Joe Baumgartner of Salem, C. H. Schunke of Salem, R. H. Bebee of Oregon City, H. H. Haynes of Portland and Mr. Jordan of Ashland. With the exception of Mr. Barrett of Albany, all favored a minimum charge for the use of the municipal auto parks. Mr. Barrett based his opposition on the belief that a charge would work a hardship on the tourist of small means.

After obtaining an expression from all those present, Mr. Pier appointed a committee composed of Messrs. Probach, Jordan, Bebee, Cramer and Barrett to draw up a uniform plan which could be given consideration. The meeting was then adjourned and the committee spent several hours discussing the plans for control and the charge which should be made. Methods of handling and registering cars and detailed plans in connection with the camp ground were given consideration. At a late hour this afternoon the committee was still in session.

School Meets to Be Held In May

The rules and regulations governing the second declamation, track and field contests to be held by the public schools of the county are now being distributed by County School Superintendent O. C. Brown. The first of these contests was held last year and was very successful and this year even more interest is expected.

In order to provide elimination contests the county is divided into nine sections. The schools in each of these districts hold separate meets and the winning teams in each event is chosen to represent that district. These teams are then brought to Roseburg on a date some time in May, the exact date not yet having been chosen, and that time will compete for the county-wide championship. In order that the competitors may not be handicapped by being matched with older or younger children, each event has different classes, the classes being picked according to the ages of the competitors. A handicap of 25 points is placed upon all schools having an enrollment of two hundred or more, as these schools have a great advantage in selecting contestants because of the number of pupils from which to choose. The school winning the highest number of points is declared county champion and receives a handsome banner.
