Umpqua Forest Map Almost Done

Work on the new map of the Umpqua national forest has been practically finished, and Victor Fisch, the draftsman who has been making the map, is preparing to take it into the Portland office where a tracing will be made. This map has been prepared in the local forestry office under the direction of Supervisor Ramsdell. Rangers who are perfectly familiar with every foot of the forest lands have watched each step and have seen that all corrections and new entries were properly made. The new map will be perfectly accurate and will show a great deal more of the local points of interest than has ever before appeared on a forest map. The rangers and supervisor have endeavored to obtain complete accuracy in this map and believe that there are very few errors. There are some portions of the forest which as yet are not very well known and in these places there may possibly be some errors, but in those parts that have been surveyed there will be little deviation. The map is now completed in pencil and as soon as the final touches can be made to the rough draft, a tracing will be taken from it and then a plate made and the map printed for distribution. The draftsman in making this map has endeavored to keep the lettering very small so that although there is a great mass of detail given the map does not appear crowded. Recreation maps are to be made soon and will be issued for public distribution, while the regular forest maps will be given out only to members of the forest service or to those who are especially interested in the forest for some particular purpose other than recreation.
