Mrs. Sparks Passes Away This Morning

Mrs. G. W. Sparks, for many years
a resident of this city, passed away
early this morning at the home of her
granddaughter, Mrs. C. I. Anderson,
a few miles from Springfield, Oregon.
Mrs. Sparks underwent an operation
at the Eugene hospital about two
months ago and several days ago was
moved to the home of her grand-
daughter and was thought to be im-
proving rapidly when the sad news
was received here this morning.
Mrs. Sparks was 72 years of age.
She is survived by her husband,
G. W. Sparks of this city and one
daughter, Mrs. Maudie Smith, now of
Springfield, besides many dear and
loving friends who will regret sin-
cerely to hear of her sudden death.
Funeral arrangements have not
been made as yet but it is very prob-
able that services will either be held
in Eugene or Montana.
Mr. Sparks left early this morning
for Springfield.

Local S. P. Agent Attends Conference

L. B. Moore, local S. P. agent,
spent Sunday at Eugene at a meet-
ing of the agents to discuss the meth-
ods of cutting down the company's
freight claim bills. Men from all
parts of the division extending from
Portland to Ashland were present.
A year ago the Southern Pacific
company inaugurated a campaign to
prevent loss from damage claims on
freight shipments over its lines. A
department of claim prevention was
created and F. G. Fagan of San Fran-
cisco, was appointed superintendent.
This department is divided into ten
divisions and in these divisions there
are 183 districts. In the Portland
division there are nine districts and
L. B. Moore, agent at Roseburg is
chairman of the division and Moody
Hollis is chairman of the Eugene dis-
trict.
During the past few years, accord-
ing to figures quoted yesterday by A.
J. Gillette, local agent, the company
has paid claims amounting to \$2,-
000, each year on account of dam-
age of goods shipped over its lines
or because shipments were lost. It is
for the purpose of eliminating as
much of this loss as possible that
this organization was effected.

president of the Virginia Shipbuild-
ing Corporation, and seven others
were returned today by the federal
grand jury which has been in session
investigating war-time transactions
of Morse and his associates with the
shipping board.

OREGON COURT DECISION UPHOLD

preme court today upheld the Oregon
court decision giving the government
judgment of \$18,204.84 against Wil-

money Jones was alleged to have re-
ceived in transactions.
