Tunnel Under Railroad Tracks at Umpqua Bridge Site Is Now Considered

County, City and Railroad Company May Cooperate In Construction of Concrete Tunnel Under Railroad Tracks to Connect up With Suspension Bridge.

Work on the footbridge to Umpqua Park is progressing rapidly and within a short time the bridge will be ready for use. It is to be one of the finest suspension bridges in the state and will be exceptionally strong, having a capacity of approximately 2000 pounds to the running foot. Towers have been built on two of the piers of the old bridge and 6 1/2-inch cables have been suspended from the towers and anchored into concrete foundations with huge turnbuckles. Small cables hung from the six large cables hold up swinging girders on which the flooring is being laid. Solid sides will be built for a portion of the distance but on the main part of the bridge the sides will be of woven wire with a small cable at the top for a hand rail. The bridge because of its length will probably have a good deal, but it is so solidly constructed that there will be absolutely no danger. It is so strongly built that there would be no danger in crossing it with a loaded automobile if the flooring were wide enough. A large crew has been engaged to finish the structure and rapid progress is now being made.

With the bridge nearly done the question of crossing over or under the railroad tracks is being given more consideration and in that connection a new plan is being proposed.

The new plan, which proposes a tunnel large enough to accommodate foot passengers underneath the tracks, has the endorsement of the county court and of the railroad company, both of which have agreed to participate in the cost and in the event the city will agree to assist work on the tunnel will be started in the near future.

The attorney for the railroad company during the hearing held in this city last week regarding overhead crossings, informed the county court that the company plans to make the proposed extensions to its yards in the near future and that the bridge and a grade crossing would be a de-

luded menace to the safety of the children, as there will be much switching and storage of cars in that neighborhood.

He intimated that the railroad company is ready to aid in the construction of a small tunnel underneath the tracks, the tunnel to be long enough to provide an underground crossing when the extensions have been completed as planned.

This tunnel would be built of reinforced concrete and would be built on such plans as to permit enlargement in the event a larger bridge is ever built and a crossing for vehicles needed. It would be winged at the end leading onto the approach of the bridge so that persons crossing the bridge would be unable to get onto the railroad tracks without first going through the tunnel. This would provide for the safety of the children who would be prevented from reaching the tracks.

In the event the city will agree to co-operate with the county and railroad company in building the tunnel, County Judge Guine states that the county will connect up the tunnel with the Pacific highway.

To do this a new road will be built from the bridge site on Mill street to the highway, giving the residents of lower Mill street an outlet and at the same time giving the children a much closer route to the school. The cost of the proposed tunnel will be approximately \$2500, while the roadway the county proposes to build will add several hundred dollars to the improvement. The bridge is costing about \$2500. The cost will start work in the spring on the road along the base of Mt. Nebo. A suit to condemn right of way through the Lindsay property is now in the circuit court and will be heard as soon as court convenes again.

The residents of Umpqua Park are greatly pleased over the prospects of early completion of the foot bridge, and as soon as it is opened are preparing to celebrate the occasion with a big community party.
