Red Cross Wants Bed Clothing

Touching appeal for aid, one of many being received by the local Red Cross chapter, was received this morning by Miss Agnes Pitchford, relief worker. A woman in need writes: "My husband has influenza and has been sick all winter so he can work only a small part of the time and I am of bedding almost entirely. My husband has hoped to get able to go to work but he has not been able to. He has been in bed for a long time and I am doing my best with so little help."

Miss Pitchford is daily in receipt of appeals. Bedding is badly needed by many families and people who are sick. Extra bedding can do a great deal of good if they will turn what they have over to the Red Cross. The Red Cross also needs especially for the sick. One pair of women's shoes is needed and shoes and socks are needed for girls from 11 to 15 years of age and for boys from 11 to 15 years of age.

During the epidemic the Red Cross has kept very busy and has had many cases, taking two to the hospital. Because of sickness many poor families are absolutely destitute of fuel, clothing and bed covering. A ready response is needed to give comfort for some of the desperate ones.

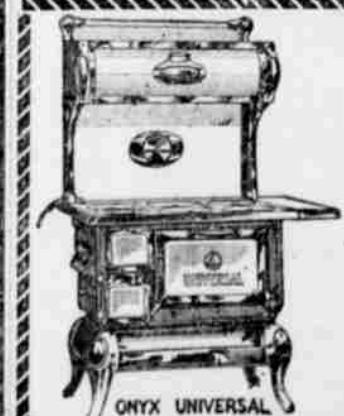
Electric Locomotive Is Ancient.
