GIVING GOOD MEASURE.

Two unemployed men asked permission the other day to chop up some firewood that was lying in a man's back yard, and agreed to do it for \$2.00. They worked quickly and got it done sooner than expected. Although a fixed bargain had been made, they seemed to feel that they had not given a full equivalent for their \$2.00. So they asked the owner if there was anything else he wanted done, and they took hold and did some more work, cleaning up rubbish, until they were sure they had fully earned their \$2.00. Such incidents are encouraging, as they are in striking contrast with the spirit so lamentably manifested during the war. There are many more of these conscientious people, who are determined to give good measure, than some of us realize. Illustrating the other spirit, a man who supervised some accounts at one of the army cantonments during the war, says that one afternoon he found that a plumber and his helper had both lain down in the building where they were supposed to be working, and both had gone to sleep. Yet the plumber was earning all the time at the rate of \$100 a week and the helper a correspondingly large wage. This failure to give an honest return for money received, he remarks, was constantly being shown at that time, both by people who sold supplies and those who worked for wages. St. Luke's gospel says, "Give, and it shall be given unto you, good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over." The country is now paying heavily for the lack of this spirit shown during the war. A time when men are concerned mostly with getting their pay and do not care whether they give good value or not, is sure to be followed by penalties of commercial distress. But a time when men become anxious to give the full equivalent for the money they receive, is a time when foundations of prosperity and abundance are being laid.

CONFERENCES IN LABOR TROUBLES.

Anthracite coal operators recently announced at Philadelphia that they were willing to meet representatives of the United Mine Workers for conference. In view of the difficulty frequently encountered in getting representatives of conflicting interests to meet and confer, the public will be greatly pleased. Many people have felt that if the heads of the various European powers could have been persuaded to get together in one room in July, 1914, and talk over their differences, there would have been no war. Sometimes it works that way in labor troubles. One party to an industrial dispute will often say that the position taken by the other side is so unreasonable, that it is useless to talk, and that the only way to force such people to yield is to fight it out. But such people overlook the power of justice and fair argument. If one party is reasonable and the other party is unreasonable, in the long run the reasonable side is apt to win over the other. Getting together around one table promotes better feeling, if people only keep their temper. Some men, when they hear a point of view stated that seems irrational, will become heated, they shout at the top of their voices, they charge their opponents with base motives, and the fat is in the fire. But others keep control of themselves. By their clear analysis of a situation, they often win their argument. The men who will succeed best in the difficulties of the future are those who are thus able to keep their temper, and to state their case without heat and with fair-mindedness. Something is usually gained when opposite factions stop hurling charges at each other, and get together and talk in a conciliatory way.

All six of the laboratory workers of the U. S. public health service who have been studying tularaemia, a disabling sickness of man which has been known, particularly in Utah, for the last five years, have contracted the disease, two of them being infected in the laboratory in Utah and the other four in the hygienic laboratory in Washington. Such a record of morbidity among investigators of a disease is probably unique in the history of experimental medicine. Two of these workers are physicians; one is a highly trained scientist; and the others are experienced laboratory assistants. One of them contracted the disease twice, once in the laboratory in Utah and again, two years and five months later, in the laboratory in Washington. In these workers the disease began with a high fever, lasting about three weeks, and was followed by two months of convalescence. The disease has few fatalities, its chief interest arising from the long period of illness which it causes in midsummer, when the farmers of Utah are busily engaged in cutting alfalfa and plowing sugar beets. The studies into the cause and transmission of the disease show it to be due to a germ, *Bacterium tularensis*, which is conveyed by six different insects; the blood-sucking fly, the stable fly, the bedbug, the squirrel flea, the rabbit-licking, and the mouse louse. Only the first four of these are known to bite man. It appears possible that the germ may also enter through unbroken skin; for instance, that of the hands.

Salem Aroused Over Revolting Crime

The city of Salem is greatly aroused over the crime committed there last Sunday, when an unidentified man intercepted two small girls and lured them to a pasture and attacked them. Citizens there are subscribing to a fund started by the Salem Capital Journal, and on the campaign to raise reward money, \$1000 was posted as a reward for information leading to the arrest and capture of the perpetrator. In the event he is captured there will be no parole, according to Senator Lachmund, a member of the parole board who is quoted as follows:

Declaring that he would like to be one of the vigilantes to pull the rope and give the pervert who assaulted two little girls Sunday proper punishment, Senator Louis Lachmund yesterday added \$100 to the reward offered to information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty party.

"As long as I am a member of the parole board, the public can rest assured that if this degenerate is ever sent to prison, he will never secure a parole," declared Mr. Lachmund.

Five hundred dollars in addition to the four rewards of \$100 each posted previously, was last night offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the moral pervert who Sunday morning assaulted two little Salem girls who were on their way to Sunday school.

The other rewards were offered by the Salem street car employees, Homer H. Smith, insurance man, an unnamed contributor and The Capital Journal.

Although scores of clues followed by officers have resulted in failure to determine the identity of the pervert, new leads are being received constantly by the police department and sheriff's office and hope is yet held that an arrest may come within a short time.

"We are still devoting practically all of our time to the pervert case," Sheriff O. D. Bower said that afternoon. "We are overlooking no clue in an effort to get any information which will cause the man's arrest."

BUSINESS IMPROVING.

"Business is improving and they are very optimistic in the east regarding the present outlook," says Mr. C. I. Lewis, assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association. Mr. Lewis has just returned from an extended trip in the south and east. He has had a splendid opportunity to thoroughly analyze the situation, as he visited the principal cities in practically all the eastern as well as the southern states. The crops are very low in practically all kinds of dried and canned goods, but situated, and with the shelves of the dealers becoming depleted, there is every prospect that there will be a scarcity in these goods early in the season.

Revival Services Will Soon Start

Rev. W. S. Gordon will begin a series of special meetings at the First Methodist church Sunday morning. Rev. Gordon attended school at Pacific University, and later took some work in philosophy and history in Willamette University, Salem. Although he was licensed to preach at the age of 17, he only exercised his right occasionally until the fall of 1907. At that time he resigned his position as principal of the Cornelius high school, and became pastor at Drain. The Drain normal was then a flourishing school, and as nearly all of the faculty and students were in his congregation, his brethren dubbed him "The Chaplain of the Normal." He is not a professional evangelist.



While he has had inducements to enter that field, he believes he can do more lasting good by remaining in the pastorate, where he can follow up his converts and get them more firmly established in a consistent life.

He says too many evangelists are like the cowboy of pioneer days who would "shoot up a town," and then leave the bewildered people to clean up after it the best they could.

He has received considerable more than a thousand converts into the church. For the last eight years one noticeable thing in his work is that he has received more men than women. He enjoys mingling with young people, and for many years has been a teacher at the Epworth League institutes. This series of addresses has been especially planned for the inspiration and help of young people.

While every night will appeal to some special group such as railroad men, high school students, etc., all will find something of interest any time they can be there.

Mr. Gordon is a confirmed optimist. He believes in business and in wholesome enjoyment. He does not believe that "this is the devil's world," as some folks teach. And he believes it is going to be a better world. He says: "A knowledge of history is heartening, since it teaches us that the so-called 'Golden Age of the Past' is a myth. The true golden age is in the future. Science and the Bible both teach that."

He believes in a free press and common sense religion. "A man can be a Christian without being a crank. Some good people are like the ancient Cythians. They are religious 'to keep the heavens from falling on their heads.' I am more interested in keeping boys and girls from falling."

"It is hoped that the meetings will help other churches as well as the one in which it is held, and all are welcome no matter what ones opinions may be. Prof. Isaacs will sing each evening."

Oswald West

Sues Coos County

EUGENE, March 10.—Ex-Governor

Oswald West has brought suit

against Coos county in the circuit

court of Lane county to recover \$19,-

685, which he alleges is due him for

commission on \$492,141 which he

was instrumental in causing the federal

government to refund to Coos

county. The money returned was on

a wagon road land grant which the

government had deeded to Oregon.

West alleges that Coos county sent

him to Washington to appear before

congressional committee in February,

1918, and March 1, 1918, congress

allowed the claim mentioned. He

also alleges that March 13, 1920, the

Coos county court agreed to pay him

1 per cent of the sum refunded by the

government.

West further alleges that when he

went to cash the warrant, the latter

had been ordered held up and he was

offered but \$1,000 which he refused

to accept. The case is expected to

come up within a few days.
