SENTENCES ARE
PASSED ON TWO

Terms of One Year Each Are
Doled Out to Two Law
Violators.

RETURN INDICTMENTS

Oran Sutton, Bad Check Artist, and
George Larsen, Accused of Larceny
Are to be Taken to the State
Penitentiary for Crimes

Sentences of one year each were doled out today by Circuit Judge J. W. Hamilton to Oran O. Sutton, bad check artist, and George Larsen, who entered a plea of guilty to a charge of larceny.

Indictments against both were returned by the grand jury and the prisoners were immediately arraigned. Sutton was charged with passing fraudulent checks and entered a plea of guilty. He had nothing to say except that the J. C. Penny store did not lose on the transaction for which he was indicted. District Attorney Neuner informed the court that Sutton passed a \$13 check on the J. C. Penny store and a \$5 check on a cleaning and pressing establishment in this city and two checks amounting to \$29 on an Oakland druggist. Sutton is wanted at Hillsboro, Portland, Salem and Eugene for similar transactions, the district attorney stated. Sutton's wife has been working to make good the money obtained by her husband, according to a letter in the hands of the sheriff, but in spite of this fact, the court was informed that Sutton has persisted in distributing worthless checks. Judge Hamilton passed a maximum sentence of one year in the penitentiary.

George Larsen was arraigned on the charge of larceny in a dwelling. He also pleaded guilty and asked for an immediate sentence. District Attorney Neuner stated that Larsen's case had attracted sympathy from the grand jury so that a light indictment was returned although a much more serious charge could have been placed against him. Larsen has a deformed back and is apparently not over-intelligent. He has been brought up in a poor environment and a short time ago left his home in the middle west and has been traveling as a hobo.

Recently he entered the school house at Glendale, and the home of B. E. Hayes at Merlin. He stole a rifle, guitar and other articles, which were found in his possession. He was also given a sentence of one year. Sheriff Starmer will probably leave tonight or tomorrow morning for Salem with the prisoners.
