Road Contracts to Be Allowed

SALEM, March 18.—Expenditures for the state highway department during the year 1932 will aggregate approximately \$15,000,000, according to a report prepared today by Albert Nunn, state highway engineer. This amount includes \$1,750,000 to be expended in payments of interest and maturities on bonds and \$990,000 to be expended in the construction of forest roads. Of the latter amount the state will contribute \$600,000 and the federal government \$390,000.
Unfulfilled contracts carried over from the year 1931 include 131 miles of grading, 120 miles of rock and gravel surfacing and 45 miles of paving. It was estimated by Mr. Nunn that it will require approximately \$500,000 to pay off the retained percentages and other unpaid costs in connection with the 1931 contracts.
New contracts awarded up to March 15 of this year include 73 miles of grading, 24 miles of rock and gravel surfacing and 12 miles of paving. Work under these contracts

will cost approximately \$1,023,500, Mr. Nunn said.
Contracts which are now being considered by the highway commission and which probably will be awarded before the end of the year include 150 miles of grading, 300 miles of rock and gravel surfacing and 35 miles of paving.

It was said here today that work on the contracts now awarded will start as soon as the weather will permit, and every effort will be made to have the work completed by next fall. It is believed by Mr. Nunn and members of the highway commission that not more than a few of the contracts awarded up to the present time will be carried over into the year 1933.

Contracts affecting Douglas county, awarded between December 1, 1931, and March 15 of this year, follow:
Myrtle Point-Bridges section of Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, 10 miles, \$153,000.

Myrtle Creek section Pacific highway, 30 miles, \$9500.

Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section Pacific highway, 11 miles, \$239,500.

Canas Valley section Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, 8.5 miles, \$97,000.

Douglas county contracts carried over from the year 1931 to be completed this year, follow:
Lane county line-Drain section Pacific highway, 17 miles.

Roseburg-Wilbur section Pacific highway, 5.35 miles.

Yoncalla-Drain section Pacific highway, 9 miles.

Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section Pacific highway, .85 mile.

Winston-Canas Hill section Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, 10.53 miles.

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PLAN MINOR WORLD'S SERIES

SANG AS GUEST, NOT ARTIST

Jean de Reszke Accepted Remuneration Only When He Appeared on the Stage.

Jean de Reszke is a great gentleman, not merely as one of an ancient, historical Polish family, but in his own dignity of character and of bearing. The famous tenor, now retired, is living at Nice.

He found himself naturally at home within social portals then inaccessible to the world of artists; he was an aristocrat among the most aristocratic. He insisted on this, not blatantly, of course; he would not have been an aristocrat if he had; but in the important particular that he accepted remuneration only when he appeared on the stage; never as a guest of society.

A little anecdote of the time will illustrate how De Reszke insisted on thus remaining a guest. A great financier invited him and his brother to one of his great banquets, and at the end, naturally, the artists were asked to sing. They did so. Then the host, who was generosity itself—it was, in fact, the late Alfred de Rothschild—presented them two blank checks.

Herewith a dilemma; on the one hand two proud aristocrats asked to break their rule of accepting no fee for a performance in social life, on the other an act of seeming rudeness in refusing what was meant to be a compliment from a host.

They settled the matter by accepting the checks, and sending them back next day blank and torn.

Too Much for Airplane.

Efforts to make use of airplanes for the purpose of assisting in the efforts to scale high mountains have not been attended with any great success. In the Alps the varying conditions of the snow surface has been a serious detriment to making landings and "getaways." Again, on heights above 10,000 feet the rarity of the air begins to affect the steering and control of an airplane. At 20,000 feet, pilots say, control for landing is doubtful and at still higher levels it is impossible. Of course, planes have climbed to more than 20,000 feet with the pilots kept alive by oxygen. But these have been straight up and down achievements. This is largely why the airplane idea has been given up on Mount Everest.

More Dwelling Houses.

There was a decided increase in the construction of dwelling houses in this country during the first ten months of 1931, according to information obtained by the civic development department of the National Chamber of Commerce. Construction figures furnished by 44 important cities show that during the period from January to October of last year about \$600,000,000 went into new construction, while during all 1930 the total in the same cities was only \$58,000,000 more. During the shorter period this year 57.9 per cent of the total was for dwelling houses as against only 38.1 per cent in 1930. It is believed that the dwelling percentage will be larger when all figures are in.
