Civic Improvement Keynote at Meeting

Civic improvement was the key note of the semi-monthly meeting of the Roseburg Woman's club yesterday afternoon.

The program was featured by an interesting address by Rev. W. S. Gordon. This was followed by the club's endorsement of the proposed new school bond issue and some valuable suggestions along the line of civic betterment. Entertaining vocal solos were rendered by Miss Hazel James and Miss Frances Parelou. Light refreshments were served under the direction of Mrs. J. M. Judd.

Dr. Gordon suggested the construction of attractive arches, bearing appropriate mottoes, at each entrance to the city and the erection of bill board with condensed information for the benefit of the tourist. Other things which the speaker suggested in the way of a publicity campaign were local scenic views in our hotels, schools and churches; local fruits and cards of information on the tables of our restaurants and hotels; roses and trees in all our parkings; destruction of unsightly shacks a general clean-up day every three months and encouragement of home owning with a gymnasium for the young folks in the back yard. Dr. Gordon said the ideal home was one with the freedom of the farm and the advantages of the city. The speaker read two poems of his own composition and these were greatly enjoyed by his audience.

There was not a dissenting vote against the endorsement of the proposed new school bonds, the sense of the entire club being that the departments of music, manual training and domestic science should be retained. Each member of the club pledged herself to put forth an earnest effort to create interest that would insure victory for the bonds at the coming election.

Roll call brought forth the following suggestions: That the school grounds be beautified; street names be displayed; lawns and parkings better kept; better protection at the railway crossings be afforded; a system of garbage collection be installed; and an official rose be designated.
