TEACHERS' TRAINING AGRICULTURE WORK

The Teachers' Training department of the Roseburg high school is now reviewing agriculture. This work is being done almost entirely by means of the project method and is very interesting as well as instructive.

In the beginning of the work one period was spent in visiting the display room of the depot grounds by permission of C. S. Hedlin, secretary of the chamber of commerce. Samples were taken of each kind of seed which were on display there, including oats, flax, kale, wheat, etc., and specimens were collected from the mature grains, as alfalfa, wheat, corn and barley. The seed collection was arranged in a partitioned box, each division of which was labelled, while the mature seeds were mounted on cardboard and labelled accordingly.

Germination or testing of seed has also been taken up. Each member of the class has been required to germinate one hundred seeds between damp flannel cloths. In this way the percentage of good and bad seeds can be determined.

The seed planting project is now in full swing. Through the kindness of the Manual Training department and private individuals a very good hot bed has been prepared. The teacher training class has been divided into committees of three each, and a certain amount of space has been assigned to each. One of the committees has specialized in forage and fodder planting, one in garden stuffs, one in field products, one in the various flowers, and so on.

The girls are working diligently under the supervision of Mrs. Church and are learning a great deal of common sense agriculture.

CLASS PRESIDENTS CLASH

Great excitement was aroused in the high school building Tuesday when it was announced that a dozen left-over bird houses were to be given to the first twelve boys who saw Mr. King that afternoon. Raising Chickens

When you buy a hen for setting, the best kind are Plymouth Rocks or Rhode Island Reds. The hen should be of medium size and healthy and have a kind gentle disposition. Next you prepare the nest which should be a box about 15 inches square and line it with clean straw. You should put it in a dry place where it will be protected from the wind and animals. Do not let too much light in or the hen is liable to set. Before you put the eggs in be sure they are fresh and clean. An average hen will cover from thirteen to fifteen eggs. They should not be odd shaped nor larger than the average egg and they should be the same thickness all over.

While the hen is setting give her food and water once a day and be sure the hen and nest are free from insects and do not disturb the hen while she is setting. When you take the hen off and put her on the nest, handle her carefully because if you don't, when the little chickens hatch, she won't let you pick them up and you are also liable to break the eggs. In about three weeks the eggs will hatch and then you must watch the hen very carefully and if she gets restless remove the chickens that are hatched, so she won't step on them and kill them. When you take them away from the hen, be sure to keep them warm and dry. After the little chickens are about a day old feed them a little hard boiled egg and some fresh water. Be sure the water is in a shallow pan or dish because the small chickens might fall in and get drowned. They should have a dry place to go in if it begins to rain. You should have a place where they could run a little and get some feed and plenty of exercise.
