Girl Claims Tipton Is Father of Child

The case of Roy Tipton, charged with being the father of the 9 months old child of Augusta Beecroft, will be heard before Justice of the Peace George Jones, on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Under the present state law, the father of an illegitimate child may be held for its support after a hearing in the justice and circuit courts. The proceedings are of a semi-criminal nature but a penitentiary sentence or jail sentence is not inflicted. The court using its authority to determine the amount of support which must be paid by the father. In the event of a complaint by the girl, charging the man with being the father of the child, a hearing is granted in the justice court. If, in the opinion of the justice, there is sufficient evidence to warrant, the man is held for the circuit court where, if found guilty, a certain sum to be provided for the support of the child is designated. In this case Attorney Wimberly and Cordon represent the defendant, Roy Tipton, and District Attorney Neuner appears for the state and Attorney B. L. Eddy for the complaining witness, Tipton and Miss Beecroft both reside at Winchester.

Farm Chiefs Quit Their Jobs
PORTLAND, Or., Mar. 24.—Geo. A. Mansfield, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau, and E. E. Faville, editor of the Western Farmer today presented their resignations to J. C. Cooper, president of the Oregon Tax Reduction League, because of their belief that the attack made on the millage tax supporting the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college will not commend themselves to the voters of the state.

In his letter of resignation Mansfield said that he is "fully satisfied that if the measures are initiated in this hasty and ill-advised way, they will be repudiated by the people at the polls."

Resignation of the two leaders of the farmers in the state followed a three hour conference with the league leaders in which they attempted to dissuade Mansfield and Faville from their course of action.
