MEN OF GENIUS NOT "SMART"

English Professor Declares They Are, In Fact, Extremely Slow to Grasp a Point.

Defining "smartness" as the capacity to adjust oneself rapidly to the immediate circumstances, Prof. T. H. Pear, University of Manchester, said at the Educational association's annual conference at University college, that "a genius is usually anything but smart, and he distinguishes himself from the merely smart man, who lives up to the external demands, by refusing to accept the surroundings, by setting about them instead of allowing them to set about him."

"I believe that some geniuses might not achieve the topmost ranks in a good many mental tests, especially in those requiring rapid solution of problems. A genius never sees any complex problem in the same light as an ordinary person and in a mental test may appear to be stupid."

"Some brilliant scientists would make woefully bad hospital orderlies, district visitors or managers of a household. The reason is not that they cannot attune themselves to the situation."

Professor Pear divided people into two classes, the extroverts and the introverts. The extrovert won the V. C. The first class airplane fighter is a specimen of the healthy extrovert, but the mathematician who calculates the plane's stability is an equally healthy introvert.—London Daily Mail.

WILL FIGHT FOR BARGAINS

British Journal's Lament Shows That Women Are Women Though the Ocean May Divide.

A joke that blooms each January and July in the funny papers is the changed disposition of women in sale times. A good deal of it, of course, is just joke, and nothing else, but there is a certain layer of truth at the roots of it. Sarcastic

Telephones Aid Forest Rangers

The rangers who police our national forests now are using portable telephones as a result of special perfection and adaptations of this method of communication to timber country requirements.

Each ranger carries a portable telephone as part of his equipment. Wire service is maintained between the headquarters camp, field points and lookout stations.

Instead of the overhead telephone lines, the forest telephone wires hang loosely from trees 10 to 12 feet above the ground so that in case a tree falls on the line it merely will take up some of the slack and not break the wire.—Atlantic City (N. J.) Gazette.

UMPQUA PORT TO BUILD JETTIES: IMPROVE HARBORS

REEDSPORT, Or., Mar. 23.—Although shoved aside in their request for government aid after having spent more than \$200,000 of their own money for harbor construction without one cent of government help, the citizens of the port of Umpqua in mass meeting yesterday voted to back the port commission to the limit in building jetties at the mouth of the Umpqua out to their proper limit and improve the inner harbor. They will argue again the justice of their cause before every committee of congress. This will not be a divided fight, as in the past. The rival cities of Reedport and Gardiner will work together.

Two meetings were held yesterday, one in Reedport in the afternoon and the second in Gardiner at night. The latter was the more effective, as the large Reedport delegation which went to Gardiner was able to arrive at a satisfactory solution of the old-time rivalry, and a joint committee was elected to take up minor details.

The chief speakers were Fred Assenholmer, of Gardiner; R. J. Hubbard, general manager of the Winchester Bay Company; T. W. Angus, Joseph Lyons, J. W. Ford, W. R. Buck and Isaac Staples, of Portland. A committee consisting of Fred Assenholmer, J. W. Ford, C. McC. Johnson, Joseph Lyons and W. P. Reed was elected to carry on the proposition.

WARRING ON THEATER COUGH

Here Are Some Suggestions That May Aid in Doing Away With Annoying Disturbance.

Cough, and the house coughs with you, has long been a mark of the theater. It is contagious in its quickest form. Actors are now in arms against it, claiming that most theater-coughing is mere habit and could be controlled. What good the actors' protest will do remains to be seen, but the outlook for a coughless theater is not wholly hopeless. People no longer sneeze like a set piece of Paine's fireworks, and they may in time learn to refine the cough.

Of course, coughing has its uses. Discreet employment of it by an adult may keep a child's companion from hearing an improper line in a farce, but this process is wearing. It necessitates advance knowledge of the dialogue, and a larynx of iron. Best of all methods of regulating the theater cough would be by means of a cough indicator, one attached to each chair. By a delicate mechanism on the axis, a cough would be recorded—each cough of any magnitude would be rung up like car fare. Each patron would be entitled during an evening to so many—say, ten. At the eleventh, patron would vanish through a trapdoor in the floor to a first-aid station. In the basement, where throat specialists with sprays would be in constant attendance.
