NOTICE TO THE PATRONS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 4, DOUGLAS COUNTY, OREGON.

On Saturday, April 1st, 1922, the question of voting bonds to the extent of \$10,500.00 will be submitted to the legal voters of the district. Only qualified voters will be permitted to vote in this election. The qualifications of a legal voter consists of the following:

Any citizen of this state who is twenty-one years of age, and who has resided in the district thirty days immediately preceding the date of the election and HAS PROPERTY IN THE DISTRICT, as shown by the last county assessment. Ownership of shares or stock in a corporation paying taxes on property in the district will be accepted as evidence and will entitle the owner to all the privileges of a legal voter.

Where both husband and wife are joint owners of property and only one name appears on the assessment roll only the one appearing on the assessment roll will be entitled to vote. In other words, only the actual taxpayer is entitled to vote at any election involving the raising of taxes in any way.

The above rulings do not apply to elections held for the purpose of selecting members of the school board.

LLOYD GEORGE HAS RESIGNATION READY

LONDON, March 29.—Monday, Lloyd George will demand a vote of confidence on his Genoa conference policy. He has his resignation ready should he not get the 300 majority he insists upon. Opposition to "shaking hands" with Russia is growing here, and the Irish and labor strike questions loom large. There is considerable doubt therefore that he will effect the favorable vote he desires.

English Ship Builders on Strike

LONDON, March 29.—Thousands of ship building workers quit today, and three hundred thousand in all are expected to walk out due to a cut in wages. This strike is distinct from the engineering lockout announced today, when six hundred thousand quit work. The dispute in the engineering and allied trades will have added one million two hundred thousand to England's army of unemployed by nightfall, bringing the grand total to nearly two and a quarter million.
