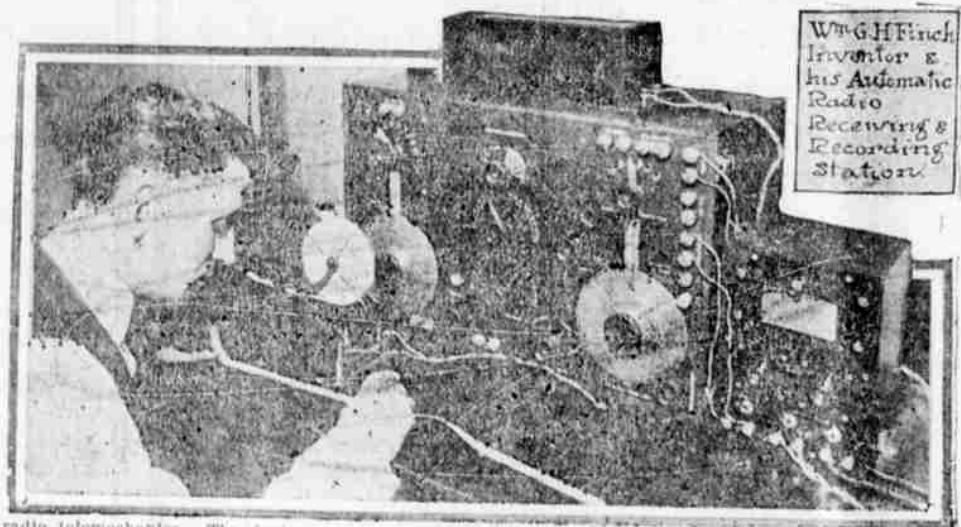

**NEW, AUTOMATIC RADIO INVENTION PICKS UP AND PRINTS WORDS ON TICKER TAPE**

Practical Tests Show Device Opens Up New Field in Radio Activity.

(International News Service) NEW YORK, March 29.—An automatic radio receiving device that will automatically pick up and print press dispatches sent in wireless code. That is the latest device just perfected for the radio enthusiast. The machine, when adjusted, runs like a clock and requires no operator. The device has been perfected and patented by William G. H. Finch, an experimental engineer, of Buffalo, who is an associate member of the Institute of Radio Engineers and other technical societies. He has been identified with radio development since 1908, holding one of the first licenses granted by the government early in 1913. During the World War he organized and had charge of the Radio First Field Artillery, N. Y. G.



Finch's radio device enables anyone to receive broadcasted code messages from any distance, a record being made of the message, which is printed automatically on a tape. It can pick up news dispatches. Gives Practical Demonstration. During the past year Mr. Finch gave practical demonstration of his invention at the Hoboken radio station of the Delaware & Lackawanna railroad. The navy department cooperated in one practical demonstration, which was successful. Radio engineers declare the Finch invention has advanced the new field

of radio telemechanics. The device has proved that explosives can be ignited by radio at almost any distance—that a moving body can be controlled in the same fashion by radio waves or motors; bells and other indicating devices can be manipulated, whether they be visible or audible to the manipulator mattering not at all. The simplicity of the Finch invention permits a novice to set it into operation. The machine can be turned in to any desired station and the apparatus adjusted so that it will pick up and record any message emanating from the station tuned to.

"Can Be Tuned In." "For instance," Mr. Finch said, "many ships carry only one wireless operator, who, of course, cannot be on duty all the time. My device can be tuned to the 400-meter wavelength—the one reserved for 'S. O. S.' calls—and when such a call is received it can be so arranged that the ship's whistle, audible or visible indicating devices, will be operated, at the same time making a graphic record of the message sent, whether the operator be present or not. "This is accomplished by a super-sensitive radio relay, the important

part of the invention and without which the feat could not be accomplished. When the instrument is tuned in and the other impulse, like water flowing into a pipe, comes into contact with the super-sensitive relay a series of impulses corresponding to the received impulse will be accurately transmitted and recorded." Mr. Finch heartily endorses the stand taken by Secretary of Commerce Hoover, who holds that the private experimenter should be assisted and not hampered by regulations affecting radio activity. **Circuit Court Is Called for April 17**

Judge Hamilton this morning issued a call for the February circuit court jury, which was excused subject to call during the month of March because of the flu epidemic, to meet on April 17th to resume the work of the term. Court was started the latter part of February and continued over into the month of March for a few days. A number of the jurymen were ill, however, and the Judge himself was not well and consequently a postponement was ordered. The attorneys were called together this morning and a number of cases set for trial. The case of the state of Oregon against W. H. Levis will be the first heard. Levis is accused of attacking James Boyce and

stabbing him with a knife. He is charged with assault with intent to kill, but has entered a plea of not guilty, and will claim self defense. He claims that Boyce made the first threatening attack with a club. This case will be followed by a damage suit in which Boyce is suing Levis for damages because of the injuries sustained. The case of the state of Oregon against H. L. Newman will follow. This is a case to establish the fact of whether or not Newman is the father of the child born to a young girl of the Yoncalla vicinity. It is to be tried for the purpose of determining whether or not he shall be required to support the child. Several civil actions have also been set for trial and will be heard during the term. **ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOOL HENS INTO TRIPLE WORK**  
(International News Service). MEDINA, O., March 30.—George Burr, poultry man, has devised a novel scheme whereby hens are deluded into increased egg production. The use of electric lights in his henery, declares Burr, has resulted in the tripling of the number of eggs he receives daily. "Electric lights fooled the hens into triple work," states Burr. "I allow the chickens a sleeping period, then turn on the lights in the middle of the night. The hens think it is daytime and are thus fooled into laying twice a day." From the same number of hens Burr says he collected 3,489 eggs in January, as against 1,154 in the same month of 1921.
