## SENATE URGED TO AMEND HARBOR BILL

Telegrams Sent by Local Individuals and Organizations Asking for Funds.

### WILL BE LAST CHANCE

Bill Has Already Been Passed by the House and Unless Amendment Can Be secured Appropriation Will Not Be Available This Year.

R. J. Hubbard, who is connected with the Winchester Bay Lumber company, spent a short time in Roseburg yesterday afternoon attending to business matters for that company. While in the city he interviewed a number of the leading business and professional men of the city for the purpose of securing their cooperation in urging a senate amendment to the House Rivers and Harbors bill which failed to carry an appropriation for the Umpqua harbor. The bill is now before the senate having been approved by the house and this is the last opportunity to secure an appropriation this year. If the bill passes in its present form no government aid for the Umpqua harbor can be obtained this year.

As a result of Mr. Hubbard's activity, a number of messages were sent to the members of the senate committee and to the Oregon senators urging that this amendment be given favorable consideration. Messages were sent by the chamber of commerce, county court and by business and professional men individually. These messages urge the necessity of the improvements as being essential to the development of Douglas county and for the protection of the present jetty which has been built solely with funds raised by the taxpayers of the port district. The amendment is also urged as a protection to several industries in the lumber manufacturing business which have located at the mouth of the Umpqua at both Gardiner and Resdport with the assurance that the improvements would be forthcoming and would be made by the government. The fact that Douglas county is spending more than a half million dollars to construct a highway from the Pacific highway to the harbor is

### THE DELAYED DORMANT SPRAY FOR PEARS

(By County Agent B. W. Cooney.) On inspection of pear trees in the vicinity of Roseburg and Winston it seems that pear trees will be ready for delayed dormant spray in a very few days. However, this will depend on the location of the orchard and weather conditions.

The exact time to apply this spray will have to be determined by the individual himself. As the conditions vary so much in different localities it is impossible to tell each person from this office just when he should spray.

The conditions are right for this spray when the winter buds are starting just enough to expose the blossom buds but before the blossoms show much color. The exact time of this spray is very important for the successful control of the scale.

PORTLAND, Or., March 28.—(United Press.)—John J. Commuter can sympathize with Charles P. Mercer, the man from Umanak, in regard to the difficulties attendant upon raising garden truck.

Your commuter finds his crops devoured by bugs and the neighbors' chickens. Trade winds blow Mercer's truck stuff out to sea, or spread it over the coast of Alaska.

Mercer is here for his annual vacation, while his highhouse and fog station at Cape Satchel, Alaska, is closed during the season of closed navigation.

"No, we don't worry much about woman suffrage, the modern styles, or jazz, or any of the other things that Chicago feature writers get grey hairs about every week or so, up there at Cape Satchel," declared Mercer.

"You see, the government won't allow women folks in the lighthouses and then, too, I'm not married. We're seldom bothered with things of that sort.
