SENATORS WILL
SUPPORT UMPQUA

McNary and Stanfield Wire Support For the Proposed Senate Amendment.

CLAIM IS APPRECIATED

and Data Cause Him to Believe That Port of Umpqua Should Have Government Aid.

"From personal investigation and from data in my possession I keenly appreciate the claims of the Port of Umpqua for present governmental aid," telegraphed Senator Charles L. McNary, U. S. senator from Oregon, in answer to telegrams sent from Roseburg in behalf of the Port of Umpqua, which is endeavoring to secure an amendment to the Rivers and Harbors bill now before the senate. "As a member of the Senate Commerce committee, I will do everything in my power to include a provision to appropriate funds for this improvement," the telegram which is signed by Senator McNary, reads. Similar telegrams were sent to Judge Hamilton, president of the Roseburg chamber of commerce and to local individuals. Senator McNary's support for this measure will doubtless have a strong influence. As a senior member of the Oregon delegation he will be looked to for recommendations on the Oregon appropriations and his backing of the Umpqua project will doubtless have considerable strength and will greatly aid in the effort to secure an amendment to the bill.

Senator S. N. Stanfield wires: "I am doing all I can for Umpqua. Will write." The pledged support of these two senators will give great aid to the port in its fight and may be responsible for a change in the bill.

The measure has been passed by the house carrying appropriations for all of the harbors with the exception of the Umpqua port. The action taken by the taxpayers of that district in this matter is believed to warrant a government expenditure and the senate is being asked to ratify an amendment to the bill providing a sufficient amount to protect work already done.
