Woman Mayor, 80, Wars on Male Vamps and Hits "Wets"

Says Dry Efforts "Like Trying to Mop Up Lake Erie" but Are Beneficial.

MAGNETIC SPRINGS, O., March 30.—Declaring the efforts of the government to enforce the Eighteenth Amendment remind her of a little boy trying to dry up Lake Erie with a one-ounce sponge, Mrs. Mary McFadden, eighty, who recently became mayor of this little village, let fall for the benefit of a band of church members who visited her such pearls of wisdom as would do credit to the late King Solomon.

"Prohibition leaders must remember," she said, "that Rome wasn't built in a day, and they can't expect the few thousand agents now employed to enforce the law among all the millions of inhabitants of this country. The effect of the prohibition law will be most noticeable twenty years from now, when children will not know the meaning of the term 'whiskey'."

Replying to a question regarding her attitude on the present-day girl's mania for bobbed hair, short skirts and rolled stockings, Mrs. McFadden said that no real mother would appeal to the authorities or the press for assistance in rearing her own children.

Tip for Distinguishing.
"However," she said, "I believe that some of the mothers whose skirts are just as short as their daughters' should encourage the daughters to bob their hair as a mark of distinction between parent and child."
