YOUNG PEOPLE'S OPPORTUNITY.

Thirty years ago, millions of boys started to work at five cents an hour, and they might work 10 or 15 years before they could gain an average workingman's pay. It was a mighty hard proposition for a young fellow to get a start in those times.

In these times when so many young people have good educations and technical or vocational training, a lot of them get very good pay in a short time after leaving school. The majority of them, however, have not used this opportunity to the best advantage.

The people who lived 30 years ago would have been dumbfounded if they could have seen how young men and women spent money during the flush times of 1919 and 1920. Here was a chance such as never came to youth before, to get a splendid start in life. For two or three years these young folks could earn more money than many capable business men had been able to gain in previous years. But it dropped out of sight like a snow storm under a southern sun. The girls blew it in for fur coats and silk stockings and costly finery, and the boys threw it away with equal speed and recklessness.

Many of these young people should have turned over a lot of this easy cash to their parents, who had toiled and slaved many years to keep these youngsters in school. Some of it went that way, but much more was spent on pleasures and luxuries.

The best of these opportunities have now passed, as the country has come down to hard pan. Still, the chances for young people are a lot better than formerly. Their school training shortens their apprenticeship. Many young fellows earn good pay on machine work, the operation of which can be learned in a short time. Many young women are well paid in clerical jobs. The years before they marry are a time when they should set aside savings. They should be generous to the fathers and mothers who have struggled to give them their start.
