Plans on Court House Submitted

Charles H. Burgraf, Albany architect, who is preparing the plans for the Glendale high school building, has submitted to the county court plans for the remodeling of the courthouse. Mr. Burgraf would extend the west wall and would add to the size of each of the floors, putting the fall on the north side of the courthouse. The court has received several sets of plans for the remodeling of the building since the grand jury filed its report, but as yet has taken no action. Whenever the court mentions remodeling there is a storm of protest, as practically everyone who has inquired into the situation states that it would be throwing money away to attempt to remodel the present structure, and insist that a new building be constructed. This it is believed could be done without an increase in taxes by using the money now going for timber cruises and by using the \$50,000 which the county has in the courthouse fund.
