### Second Attempt to Break Jail Foiled

sent to the isolation station and which prevented him being sent overseas with the troops to which he was assigned. This disease has become chronic and has brought on rheumatism which causes him considerable suffering.

He has managed to convince himself that he is a bad man and that everyone else is against him and that it no use to try to go straight. He insists that everyone is trying to "frame" him and attempts to be as disagreeable in every respect as possible.

He was sentenced to a term of from one to fifteen years in the Washington penitentiary for horse-stealing and was recently paroled. When the officer came to take him back to Washington, he refused to go without extradition papers and consequently forced the officer to return to Washington without him. This act alone will probably compel him to serve out the full time of his sentence.

Sacks realizes that he has a good long period of confinement before him and is believed to be desperate. His mind is such, the officers state, that he does not realize consequences of his actions and as he says, is ready to take a chance on anything. When arrested he attempted to draw a revolver and was only prevented when officers grabbed his arms from each side and removed the weapon before he could use it. The Washington officers are expected to come for him within a few days and the sheriff states that he will be very glad to get rid of him. As it is, every precaution is being taken to prevent him from doing further damage to the jail since his attempt to escape by wrecking the cake door, an act which cost the taxpayers of this county over \$25. Care is also being taken whenever it becomes necessary to open the cell.

The other occupants of the cell are two soldiers from Camp Lewis. They are likeable young fellows and are not believed to be at all dangerous. It is feared, however, that under the leadership of Sacks, they will attempt some stunt which will result in a very serious charge being placed against them. At present they are being held for the postal authorities on a charge of having stolen a package from a mail box.
