Following are three of the compositions written by the pupils in Miss Hatheway's 6-A history class:

De Soto.

De Soto was a Spanish man who started to find gold in Florida. He was the governor of Cuba at the time. He left his wife as governess.

De Soto had 500 men and 200 horses. He landed at Tampa Bay after a long trip, May, 1539. He burned his boats so his men could not return.

De Soto was cruel to the Indians and had many battles with them. Everywhere he went he demanded food, and this caused many fights. At last he reached the Mississippi river after many hardships. Here he took sick and died, May, 1542. His men buried him in the mighty river he had discovered.

After his death the men built ships and sailed home.

De Soto.

De Soto was one of Pizarro's trusted captains. He was also hunting gold. He helped Pizarro capture the Inca, leader of a Mexican Indian tribe, but had no hand in the murder. He did not find gold, however, but had many hardships. His difficulties increased daily. His men tried to persuade him to turn back, but De Soto was stubborn, and he refused. At one town he came upon an Indian chief sitting upon cushions on an upraised platform. De Soto compelled him to get down and give him and his men food, then march with them. In such matters as these, the Indians and Spaniards became bitter enemies.

In the spring of 1541 they reached the banks of the Mississippi. At this place they built four boats in which they crossed the river, and continued the search for gold. In May, 1542, De Soto fell ill and died. His companions feared that if the Indians found out that their leader had died they would attack them, so in the blackest part of the night they wrapped his body and lowered it into the Mississippi he had discovered.

De Soto wished to find gold, silver and other products asked the king to make him governor of Cuba, which he did. He also gave him permission to explore Florida.

De Soto and other men sold things to go, and in May, 1539, set out with six hundred men. He explored Florida with about five hundred men and two hundred horses. They landed at Tampa Bay six weeks after starting.

De Soto made the Indian chiefs give him corn and make the squaws and other Indians carry baggage. He killed many Indians and treated them very cruelly. He cared nothing for their suffering but thought of gold only.

On one occasion De Soto had a terrible fight with the Indians and killed many, setting fire to the huts. Many of his own men were killed or wounded. Supplies, arms and clothing were burned with the huts, so in harming the Indians he harmed many of his own men.

De Soto found no gold, but in the spring of 1541 he reached the Mississippi river. Finally he decided to go to the coast and build ships to send for aid, but in May, 1542, he died. His followers buried him in the Mississippi river that he had discovered.

The geological formation of the famous diamond region in the state of Bahia, Brazil, shows that at some time in the history of the world the mountains there were thrown up by a hot mass and the carbon in the stone crystallized into gems. It was, in effect, an electric furnace on a gigantic scale. In Brazilian diamond mining natural water courses play an important part. Water and the weather gradually disintegrate the rocks, and the diamonds are washed down into gullies and the beds of rivers, whence they are recovered by the miners. In some places divers are employed to work at the bottom of the rivers, filling sacks with silt that contains the diamonds. The river beds are rich in precious stones which cannot be extracted advantageously, if at all, by the methods now in vogue.

Exercise for Blood Pressure.

Certain vigorous exercises are distinctly beneficial in most cases of too high blood pressure. At a recent meeting of the New York Academy of Medicine Dr. C. Ward Crampton described his favorite treatment of this trouble, which included regular exercise.

In the earlier stages the following program was advised: 1. Morning exercise, 12 minutes; 2. Walk three-quarters of an hour; 3. Vigorous exercise with sweating three times a week; 4. In the open half a day.

In advanced cases the exercise should be milder. Of course, exercise is only a part of the general treatment, and there are many cases in which it should not be given, especially those in which the heart and kidneys are seriously involved.

Roosevelt's first appearance in the editorial columns of a New York newspaper was probably that in the Evening Post of February 25, 1878. Roosevelt was then a sophomore at Harvard, eighteen years old. The Evening Post devoted a long editorial to the question whether the English sparrow had been a benefit or a pest. It mentioned a recent discussion of the subject at an ornithological club in Cambridge, Mass., saying: "Mr. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., of this city, gave the birds credit for doing some good, but thought that they often ate the buds of fruit trees, and he says that in Egypt they are wasteful devourers of grain." In Roosevelt's "An Autobiography" a good deal is noted of his ornithological interests during these years; these interests, of course, persisted throughout his life.

Honor Belongs to Portuguese.
Quilros, the Portuguese navigator, in 1606, was the first white man to see the rugged outline of the coast of the New Hebrides, which rises abruptly out of the deep sea in the hurricane zone of the tropics. Believing he had discovered the great southern continent which was at that time the dream of navigators, Quilros may be compared to Columbus, who thought he had found a route to India when he sighted the palm-fringed shores of the West Indies.

He called his discovery Australia del Espiritu Santo, which has been shortened by traders to Santo, and is applied to the largest island of the group. Some of the other large mountains and partly volcanic islands are Ambrym, Annatam, Aurora, Apl, Pentecost, Eromanga, Mallicolo, and Tanna, the home of the "great lighthouse" of the southern isles. Tanna volcano, which burst forth brilliantly every three or four minutes.

"Shoes at a Wedding."

The custom of throwing one or more old shoes after the bride or groom either when they go to church to be married or when they start on their wedding journey is so old the memory of man stretches not back to its beginning. Some think it represents an assault and is a lingering trace of the custom among savage nations of carrying away the bride, by violence; others think that it is a relic of the ancient law of exchange or purchase, and that it formerly implied the surrender by the parents of all dominion or authority over their daughter. It has reference to a Jewish custom mentioned in the Bible. Thus in Deuteronomy we read that when the brother of a dead man refused to marry his widow she asserted her independence of him by "loosing his shoe." It was also the custom of the middle ages to place the husband's shoe on the head of the nuptial couch in token of his dominion.
