FAMILY ROW ENDS IN JUSTICE COURT

Wife and Three Sons Turn on Husband and Step Father in Free for All Fight.

PREACHER IS ENGAGED

Minister Ends Fracas by Soaking Boy on Back of Head and Scoring a Knockout, Officers Who Make Arrest Are Informed.

A family row ended in the justice court last night, when Constable F. W. Dillard arrested Mrs. Mary Ann Hadley and her three sons, George, Elmer and Merman Burrell, charging them with beating up Wm. Hadley, husband of the woman and step-father of the three boys. Rev. Hoskins, preacher at Melrose, is also concerned with the case, although not arrested.

It appears that the family engaged in a free-for-all fight in which considerable damage was done to the persons of all those engaged, and which resulted in Hadley swearing out a complaint against his wife and three step-sons.

The Hadley family lives near Melrose, where they have been conducting a small farm. According to Mr. Hadley, the complaining witness, he engaged in a quarrel with the oldest step-son who showed fight. They engaged in a fistie encounter and the whole family joined in. One of the boys, he told the officer, grabbed a stick of wood with which he cracked his step-father over the head several times, while the mother waded in with an axe handle. Hadley says he was forced to flee for his life and rushed to the home of Preacher Hoskins. The family, he says, followed him belabouring him all of the way and even followed him into the ministers house. Here another fight occurred in which the wearer of the cloth is said to have become a participant in the party of a beligerent peace maker. The preacher, the officers were told, exhibited an ability other than oratory and knocked down one of the boys, effectually putting an end to the fight. That his argument was effective was proven by a large knot on the back of the boy's head.

Mr. Hadley came to Roseburg and swore out a complaint charging assault and battery and procured a warrant of arrest for his wife and the three boys. Constable Dillard made the arrest and brought the parties to this city.

They admit the details of the fight but claim that Hadley started the fracas by jumping on the older boy without cause. They were afraid he would kill the lad, they claim, and took hand in the encounter to stop the attack.

The woman and her sons were given a meal by the county, as the same afforded but little food and all were hungry. The officers claim that they were not provided for and were practically destitute. They were given

quarters for the night, and the case is being held up pending further developments and investigation. The woman and her sons were released without bail and are not being held under arrest.
