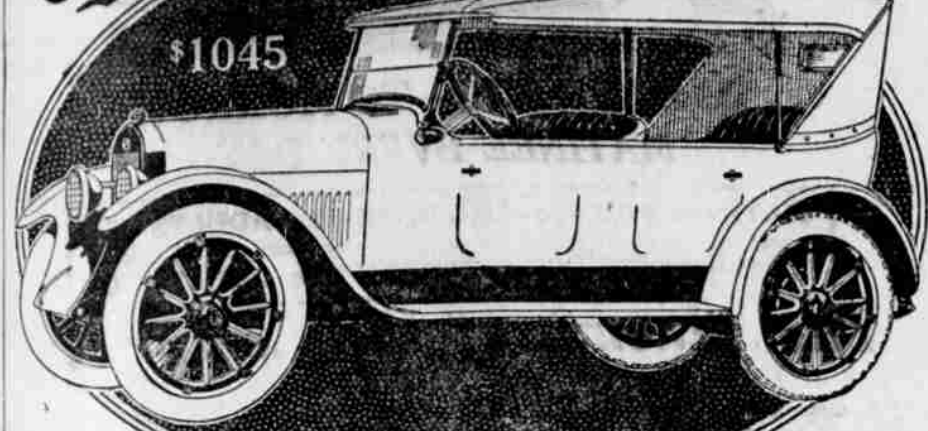

A slight modification is being made to provide for an entrance on Jackson street as well as Lane street. The main entrance formerly was planned for Lane street but under the altered plans there will be an entrance on both streets. The architects are now getting out several sets of plans to submit to contractors who will submit bids at once.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that on the 25th day of March, 1922, there was filed in the office of the undersigned an initiative petition, requesting that a special election be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on May 19th, 1922, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said city the following proposed amendment to the existing Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, to-wit:

An Act to amend Section 33 of the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, by adding thereto Subdivision 56, to authorize the City of Roseburg to acquire, by purchase, or hereinafter described for a City Park, providing for the issuance of not to exceed FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS in negotiable bonds of the City of Roseburg to provide funds for the acquisition of said lands, and providing for the levy of taxes to pay the interest on said bonds and to pay said bonds at maturity.

Be it enacted by the People of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, that Section 33 of the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, as enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, by an Act to incorporate the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict therewith, to-wit: an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of Roseburg, Oregon," approved October 10th, 1872, and an act entitled "An Act to amend an act entitled 'An Act to incorporate the City of Roseburg,' approved October 10th, 1872," also an act amendatory of said act, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 14th, 1911, and also an act to incorporate the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and to define the powers thereof, approved February 25th, 1895, and to repeal all acts amendatory thereof and in conflict therewith, which act was filed in the office of the Secretary of State on February 22nd, 1905, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 31st, 1910, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at the general election held herein on the 8th day of October, 1914, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 3rd day of June, 1915, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 22nd day of May, 1916, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 11th day of May, 1920, shall be amended by adding to said Section 33, Subdivision 56, which shall read as follows:

56. The Common Council of the City of Roseburg is hereby given full power and authority and is hereby directed to acquire, by purchase, the following described real property, to-wit: All of Block "G," Laurelwood Addition to the City of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, according to the plat and plan thereof on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of said County, for a City Park and to issue and sell negotiable bonds, payable semi-annually, and all of said bonds shall be deemed concurrent and shall be without priority as to each other. In addition to being a general obligation of the City of Roseburg they shall be a first and exclusive lien on said lands from the time said lands are acquired by the City of Roseburg until the bonds are fully paid. The Council is hereby authorized to levy a tax annually in addition to the tax levied by the Charter of the City of Roseburg to pay the interest on said bonds as the same hereinafter provided, and to borrow at any time herein authorized. The indebtedness authorized by this Charter Amendment is in addition to all other indebtedness of said City already incurred or authorized, and is not to be considered as affected by any limits of indebtedness in said Charter or otherwise. All acts of the Charter of the City of Roseburg, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances of said City, in conflict with the provisions of this Charter Amendment, are hereby amended, modified, or repealed as the case may require, in order that this amendment may be in effect.

The terms in which said proposed Charter Amendment shall appear upon the official ballot, as requested by the petitioners, shall be as follows, to-wit: "Shall the Roseburg City Charter be amended to authorize and require the City Council to purchase Block 'G,' Laurelwood Addition to Roseburg, Oregon, for a city park, and to issue and sell \$5000 six per cent bonds of said City to pay therefor, and to authorize a tax to pay said bonds and the interest thereon?"

The voting places in the respective voting precincts and the judges and clerks of election therein for holding said election in said City are the places and the judges and clerks thereof, which will be as follows: The County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, as the voting places and judges and clerks thereof for holding the primary election to be held in said city on said date.

That said election will commence and close on the 19th day of May, 1922, at the time provided by the laws of the State of Oregon.

COUNTY TRACK MEET MAY 20

Arrangements Made for Annual Contest Between Schools.

CITY IS HANDICAPPED

Small Schools Required to Submit to Heavy Handicap in Order to Give Smaller Rural Schools Equal Chance to Win.

The annual county track and field meet and declamation contest will be held in Roseburg on May 20, according to plans announced today. Following the same plan as was observed last year, sectional meets are to be held in all parts of the county. The county will be divided into nine sections and prior to May first each school shall hold a contest among its pupils to determine the best contestants in the various athletic events.

On May 15, teams representing each school shall compete in a sectional contest, eliminating the losers and that there will be teams to represent each section in the main event on May 20th.

The events themselves are divided into classes, each class being governed by the size of the competitors. This eliminates the danger of over-exertion which might result if small pupils were matched against larger ones. There are four classes for boys and an equal number for girls. There are 14 different events and in athletic contests boys and girls compete on equal terms.

In the morning will be held a declamation contest at the high school. This year last year did not create too much public interest but caused considerable rivalry among the schools. The afternoon meet will be given over to athletic meet which will be held at West Roseburg.

Because of the fact that Roseburg has such a large number of pupils to enter from in the athletic meet, the schools have agreed to submit to heavy handicaps. In the grade school Roseburg will bear a 25 per cent handicap while in the high school 15 per cent will be taken from Roseburg.

This will give the small schools an equal opportunity with the Roseburg schools in the contest. A great deal of interest was shown in the event last year and it is expected that even greater crowd will be in attendance this year. Many people were brought to the city last

year by the meet and it is hoped that this time there may be some entertainment provided for them other than the athletic meet.
