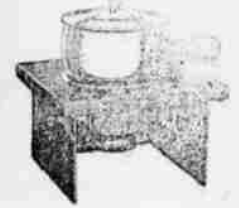

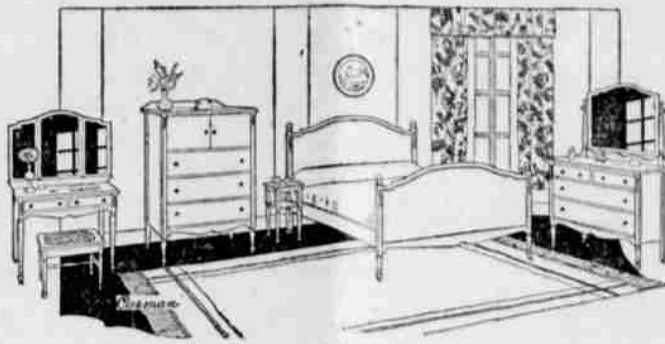

Tenth Anniversary Umpqua Valley Bank

Yesterday was the tenth anniversary of the founding of The Umpqua Valley bank, it having opened for business on April 13, 1912. The officers received many congratulations and best wishes from a large number of friends. The Ladd & Tilton bank, of Portland, their Portland correspondent, presented the bank with a magnificent bouquet of American Beauty roses.

The bank was founded by J. M. Throne, one of the present candidates for representative. The first officers were Hon. O. P. Coshow, president; B. W. Strong, first vice-president; J. C. Aiken, second vice-president; and J. M. Throne, cashier. There has been changes in the personnel of its officers since the bank was established. Mr. Coshow, after serving for six months as president, disposed of his interest in the bank and was succeeded as president by B. W. Strong. In August, 1914, Vice-president J. C. Aiken died and D. R. Shambrook and Roland Agnew succeeded as vice-presidents of the bank. In January, 1920, Mr. J. T. Goodman, Jr., and Mr. L. G. Pickens, were added as assistant cashiers.

The bank is following the same conservative policies today that it adopted when first established, and which has made it one of the leading financial institutions of Southern Oregon. Being ably managed and having always extended a personal service to its patrons it naturally follows that it has been successful. Its present capital is \$50,000.00; surplus fund \$30,000.00; deposits over \$700,000.00, and its total resources over \$800,000.
