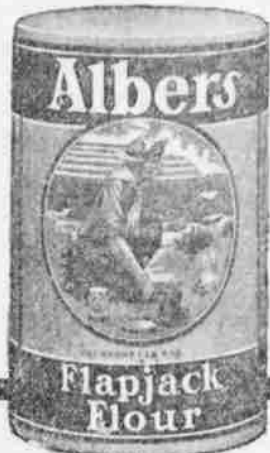

Millinery School at Melrose Hall

A three-day school of millinery and dressmaking will be held on April 17th, 19th and 21st at the Melrose Grange Hall. These meetings will continue throughout the day beginning at 10 o'clock in the morning. Miss Esther H. Cooley, clothing specialist from the extension department of O. A. C., will be present and act as instructor.

The leaders of the home demonstration project for the Melrose community state that April the 19th will be millinery day and those wishing instruction in this line should come supplied with the following articles: Full package of pins, needles and thread (milliners if possible), tape-line, thimble, shears, tailor's chalk, pencil and paper. Ladies are instructed to bring all the old hats they can find in their attic and covering fabrics which may be found in semi-worn taffeta or satin dresses, georgette blouses or petticoats. Also to bring what trimmings they may have stored away. Where an entirely new hat is desired it will be necessary to secure a buckram or rice net hat frame to cover, if possible. It is expected that a supply of frames and trimmings will be available for this meeting.

April the 17th and 21st will be dressmaking days and those wishing to take advantage of this instruction should bring the following equipment: needles, thread, pins, thimble, tape-line, shears, tailor's chalk, millin or cambric pieces to practice all pockets and bound buttonholes, garment to make or remodel and a pattern of some description if working on new material.

The only expense to those receiving this instruction will be for the material used which each are to furnish for the work they desire.

This will be an opportune time for ladies to receive help in many of their problems and the leaders of the home demonstration work in Melrose extend an invitation to the ladies of Symon Valley, Flournoy, Cleveland and Melrose communities to be present at these meetings. Miss Cooley will be able to give only a limited number of days to each county and wishes to reach as many as possible at these meetings.

After using the arvon for two weeks, the frequent shampooing, brushes and massage should keep the hair free unless it is a very stubborn case. The ear-trumpets would be beneficial as a pair of pink pajamas, or a string of amber beads, which means that they would not be beneficial at all.
