THIS HAS TO DO WITH RADIO.

In almost any newspaper we pick up nowadays, we see the following headlines: "Famed Artists Sing Tonight Over Radio," "Movie Companies to Broadcast by Radio," "Merchants Call Radio Conference," "Senators to Use Radiophones in Campaign," and so on.

This leads us to the question, "Is it a craze, a fad?" And those that know will answer: "It is the wonder of the age, and only in its infancy."

It seems that only the poet, in a fine frenzy, could begin to picture the possibilities of radio.

Moving pictures and radio are the greatest achievement of modern times. By means of the movies, the whole world and all that is happening in it, is brought to the smallest village on the map. It has done more for the bettering of understanding among nations than anything of which we can remember. The moving pictures speak all languages and talks to the whole human family.

Radio does even more, for it gives immediate hearing to all sound within its radius and very soon that radius will be the surface of the whole world. The lashing of the waves upon the rocks of the Atlantic coast may be heard distinctly on the shores of the Pacific. The speaker's audience is no longer a limited number assembled in a room. It can be made to include all who have radio receivers. And soon the receiver will be among the first of the necessities in every household.

Radio will give all who have something to say, all who have something to sing and all who have something to play, a nationwide and soon a world-wide audience.

Department stores throughout the area of the United States where the use of the radio telephone has seen the largest development, have been invited to be represented at a radio conference called by the National Retail Dry Goods association, at the Hotel Pennsylvania, New York, on April 18.

The Pyramid Pictures, Incorporated, has contracted for the installation of a powerful radio broadcasting station at their studio in Long Island. This station will be dedicated to the furthering of the best interests of the motion picture and theatrical world. It is of the latest type and may be heard by receiving stations on the Pacific coast.

It seems that the larger interests of the country have recognized the tremendous popular appeal lying behind radio.

The manner in which newspapers are devoting entire magazine sections to the new form of entertainment, sufficiently measures this appeal. The theatrical companies have no doubt realized that the universal craze for radio entertainment might possibly have a detrimental effect on theater attendance throughout the country, unless some means be devised to utilize radio in the advancement of the motion picture and its allied arts.

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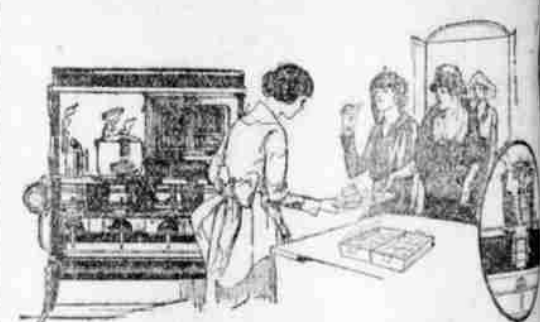
