fair, impartial and unprejudiced jury

of twelve red-blooded citizens with

the love of justice uppermost in their

minds and hearts, would be equiva-

lent to saying that no murderer will

be punished in this state and the

more diabolical and heinous the

greater the immunity for the criminal.

"We submit that the indictment

herein was turned in strict compli-

ance with the code of our criminal

procedure. The special term of court

was called and convened in compli-

ance with the statute, and the grand

jury proceedings were conducted ac-

according to law and according to its

intent and to the interpretation of

this court. The motion for a change

of venue based entirely upon news-

paper sidelights and press accounts

of the crime did not prejudice the

defendant's cause, and there was no

abuse of discretion by the lower court

in denying said motion. The impan-

neling of the jury was strictly in ac-

cordance with the law as it existed

upon our statute books and as it has

been interpreted by the various su-

preme courts of our land. There was

no abuse of discretion in denying the

challenge for actual bias, as complai-

ned of by the appellant. The record

is devoid of any conduct on the part

of any prosecuting officer that would

tend to the detriment of the defend-

ant. We submit that in the entire trial

of the case there is not a single ruling

or circumstance that denied or in-

fringed a substantial right of this defendant.

"The defendant had a fair and im-

partial trial by a fair, impartial and

unprejudiced jury, and the verdict of

that jury should not be set aside by

this court."
