Spry Grandma Finds Dancing Is Best Way to Keep Health

NEW YORK, April 18.—The ravages of Father Time can be forestalled with proper exercise and diet, declares Mrs. Margaret Josephine Blair, who, at 60, refuses to be called a "Mrs. Methuselah."

Rhythmic exercises and a diet of olives, nuts and prunes will rejuvenate old in years and make them young in body and spirit, asserts Mrs. Blair, who is assistant to Dr. Royal Copeland, New York Health Commissioner, and his anti-fat squad.

For 25 years the "dancing grandma" occupied the chair of domestic art in the University of Minnesota and was national chairman of the home economic section of the Woman's Club. At 55 she suffered from rheumatism, was undernourished and had curvature of the spine.

But she got out of bed and danced her way to health.

For an hour each day she dances—to keep the waist slim, strengthen the arches, reduce the hips, make the muscles of the neck firm and the

body supple.

Meats she rarely eats. Nuts and uncooked prunes, soaked in water for 24 hours; 15 olives, a quart of milk and a quantity of water—that's her daily diet.

"You'll never have stiff knees if you eat olives and drink lots of water," declares Mrs. Blair.

"How's your heart beating?" Inquires Commissioner Copeland. Then he listened to the thumping and pronounced it fine.

"I'll pass you," he declared. "If people would only live right and eat the right kind of food the doctors would be arrested for vagrancy. There isn't a woman in the world 80 years old who couldn't do just as you're doing—if she would."

"I'll never be old," Mrs. Blair said. "I can reduce ten pounds a week if I get too fat. I hate fat people."

Mrs. Blair is giving two public demonstrations each day so that unhealthy New York women may profit by her exercises and diet.

Catholics Score The Ku Klux Klan

EUGENE, April 17.—The declaration that Oregon republicans Catholics should support either Bean or O'Leary for governor in the primaries, because these candidates had come out against such organizations as the Ku Klux Klan, was loudly applauded at the joint banquet of the Knights of Columbus and Ladies of America at the Osburn hotel Sunday evening.

Charles Hall, Marshfield's gubernatorial candidate, was denounced by another speaker for refusing to repudiate the published statement that he was the choice of the Ku Klux Klan and for boasting that he had been promised 20,000 Multnomah county votes, on condition that all Catholic children were compelled to attend the public schools.

The Knights denied any organized political movement to elect Catholics to office, but favored voting for those candidates who represented religious liberty and equal rights before the law. The K. K. K. came in for the strongest kind of denunciation, being hailed as an unworthy successor of the American Protective association, which flourished years ago.

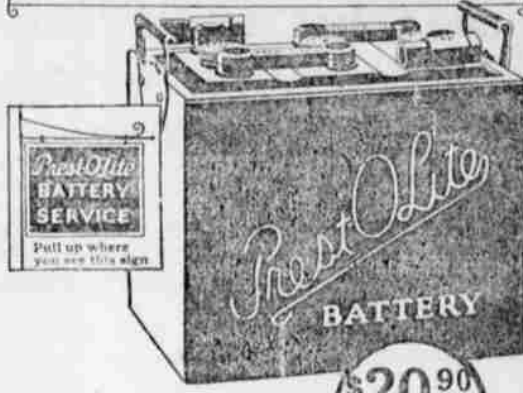
