HAWLEY ASLEEP AT THE SWITCH.

With his usual drol manner of handling matters that are placed in his hands for disposition, Congressman Hawley is holding up the appointment of a postmaster for Roseburg.

He has been "pawing" over this matter for the past several weeks, until those most interested in the appointment for this city are beginning to wonder if the "old fellow" is trying to do a little political juggling that would redound to his future success.

It is a well known fact that the names of Jas. E. Sawyers, C. S. Heinline and A. J. Geddes have been selected, and it is also a matter of public gossip that one of these three men has already been given the stamp of approval for the postmastership at Roseburg.

Then, why not the appointment?

Why this lethargy on the part of Mr. Hawley when the appointment is already "cut and dried"? If he is afraid to speak out in the open why not "pass the buck" to some other Oregon representative and let the honor fall for the appointment to one not affected by any political strings in this district. Or, is Mr. Hawley just whittling away time until the primary election has passed into history and he will have an opportunity to get a broader view of the horizon from a political standpoint?

There is no plausible excuse for holding up the appointment of a postmaster for Roseburg. A decision has already been reached at Washington by all departments except from Hawley's standpoint and it is about time this gentleman was "blowing off."

No wonder the people of the first congressional district feel that new life should be injected into Congressman Hawley's rendezvous. His "watchful waiting" policy as applied not only to the postmastership of this city, but in all things which concern the district, is becoming alarming.

Probably he is waiting until the radio system becomes perfected for long distance range that it will be possible for him to shoot his message over the Rocky mountains without interference from political grapevine wires.

But, what most people want to know is this: Who is to be Roseburg's next postmaster? Mr. Hawley knows, why don't he speak up and get the matter off his chest? If it is J. E. Sawyers, of course "Jimmy" would like to be so advised. If it is A. J. Geddes, he would not take any offense at the announcement, and "Billy" Heinline would slip his "regalia" on and hop into harness at a moment's notice.

Why this Egyptian mummy attitude on the part of Hawley we are at a loss to say.

A speaker on social hygiene says, "Not until we lose our sense of false modesty will we accomplish anything worth while in social hygiene." Maybe so, maybe so. But there are a good many Americans who didn't know we had any modesty of any kind, true or false, left to lose. One woman's definition of a "flapper" was "a young person who thinks personality is physical." Perhaps she was right. But if, with this belief, the young person only had some satisfactory standards of what constitutes physical beauty and allure, she would be apt to go in for a little more modesty of some sort merely as part of the program. Senator Norblad, candidate for congressman in opposition to Congressman Hawley, is making a whirlwind campaign of the district and incidentally making effective inroads into Hawley's alleged popularity. Mr. Norblad has the reputation of being a man qualified in every particular to handle the interests of the state in the house of representatives at Washington, D. C. He has a whole lot of ability that is lacking in many men who at present represent this state and his success at the primary election means much for the state of Oregon. So little has come from Mr. Hawley, so far as actual results are concerned, that the people of the first congressional district feel that a change at this time would be most opportune. Fifteen years in the house of representatives ought to claim some distinction for a congressman, but in the case of Mr. Hawley there seems no likelihood of any material change.

The candidate for office who believes very little of what he hears about himself or the opposition and trusts only the election day figures and then not until after he has verified them, is an ideal candidate—but he doesn't exist.

There's going to be an awful surplus of would-be candidates after the primary election is over. Some energetic fellow ought to start a home for defeated candidates.

Roseburg will be host to 250 or 300 members of the Epworth League on the dates of April 21 to 23. The convention of the Southern district will be held in Roseburg on "those dates and a large attendance is expected. 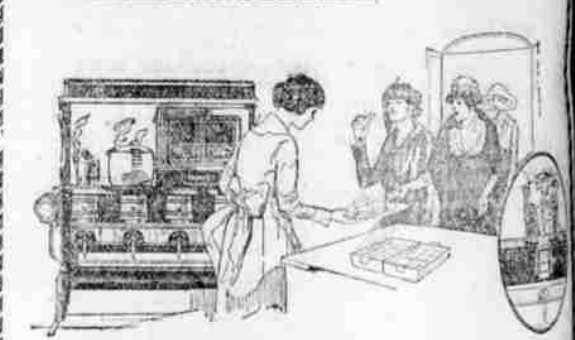
