A man who occasionally goes away on such vacation trips, remarked the other day: "When I first see Roseburg from the train, my first feeling is one of regret to come back. INSPIRED BY MAIL ORDER HOUSES.

H. E. Hart of Long Prairie, Minn., speaking before the Interstate Merchants' council recently, said that there seemed to be only one class of merchandise distributors that have had "a good standing with either the democratic or republican administration and those are the mail order houses."

"If the accusations of the attorney-general against the retail merchants were not inspired by the mail order interests," he asked, "by whom were they inspired? What would it be worth to the mail order interests to have the public educated by the attorney generals to believe that every time they made a purchase at a retail store they were being robbed? It would mean millions of extra trade for the mail order concerns."

"If you are going to be successful in 1922 you must answer the question in your advertising to your own community," Mr. Hart stated. "You stand convicted without a trial by one of our national officials. Mr. Daugherty, I believe in one of three things: You are either playing into the hands of the mail order interests, are playing cheap politics, or are ignorant of true conditions. And you can find the truth by looking over the income tax returns filed by merchants from all parts of the United States."

Every coast county will benefit by the election of Senator A. W. Norblad, candidate for congress in opposition to the present incumbent, W. C. Hawley—and don't overlook the fact that a good part of Douglas county borders on the Pacific ocean. Mr. Norblad is a man of action. He has that faculty of going after things in a way that will redound to the advancement of the district which he will represent.

The direct primary law is a very expensive luxury. In fact, it is largely responsible for the present high taxes prevailing in this state. And it does not give us any better representation, either in state or county offices.
