## U. S. SHIP SUBSIDY WORRIES ENGLAND

### Sir Mackay Edgar Is Bitter in Attack on Purposes of American Step.

### SAYS "NAVAL RESERVE"

Restriction of Immigration to United States Cuts Profits of British Ship Owners—Americans Cut Rates.

LONDON, April 21.—America's proposed shipping subsidy is causing no little worry in British shipping circles.

"Guarded comment on the proposed subsidy, declaring it to be a mistaken policy, has been made in several of the London newspapers, but it remained for the Saturday Review, owned by Sir Edward Mackay Edgar, to come out with a bitter attack upon the proposed subsidy. Sir Edward is concerned with large British shipping interests.

"Now perhaps the eyes of the blind will be opened to the real attitude of America with regard to this country," said the Saturday Review. "Our readers will remember that we gave the first news some weeks ago of a proposed subsidy for American shipping, but we refrained from comment until the rumor should have been confirmed. Now the confirmation has come, and it is worse even than we expected. President Harding has not been long in determining what America is to do with the money to be saved on her navy. Shipping and ship-building are to be subsidized to the tune of some \$32,000,000 annually.

"Naval Reserve Created."  
"A merchant marine naval reserve" is to be created; preferential rail rates are to be given to goods carried on American vessels, and 50 per cent of American immigrants are to be compelled to travel in American ships. This reactionary policy is the first outcome of the gush at Washington which we so profoundly mistrusted from the first. It is a direct declaration of war against England.

Not all of the British press is as bitter on the subject as the Saturday Review, but it is generally admitted in shipping circles that the subject of the subsidy adds gloom to an already cloudy outlook.

The United States immigration bill has already made inroads into British shipping, for the limitation of immigration has steadily cut down the receipts from third-class passenger fares and steps have been taken to protect this matter.

To add to the troubles of those interested in British shipping, the American lines have cut rates. Certain American lines are now advertising cabin passage to the United States at the rate of thirty pounds, and their advertisements appearing in the London press call attention to the fact that on these liners "American ideas of comfort" are carried out. This is indeed a poignant appeal to Americans in London, who have slight regard for the British conceptions of comfort.

The British shipping industry is a little worried about the American merchant marine and is watching every move carefully.

## Eastern Crooks on Way to the Coast

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—(United Press).—Warnings have been received here from L. S. May, president of the Northwest Sheriff's association to the effect that eastern yeggs are migrating toward the northwest. Word has also been received that the Idaho authorities have warned bankers in that state to make use of nightwatchmen and guards whenever possible. Bankers throughout the northwest generally have been apprised of the "coming storm" and warned to take every precaution.

Chief Jenkins, of the Portland police department, is of the opinion that a sudden clamping down of the lid in the east, where the yeggs have been cracking safes right and left, has caused these gentlemen of the sub-rosa nitroglycerine profession to seek a safe climate for a few weeks until the storm blows over in their native habitats. Officers report a similar migration every few years or so, when it seems as if most of the prominent safecrackers in the business congregate in one section of the country, pull off a few jobs, and then "blow" to and in some other part of the country, traveling on until it's safe for them to go back home.

It seems as if several prominent financiers who are believed to have opened banks in various parts of the country will spend the spring in the northwest. Society columns may not take much notice of the event, but police annals are sure to contain some nifty tidbits in the "arrival and departure" column. Police are planning to induce a number of these persons to remain a number of years.

## JAP GIRLS GET INTO LINE

Increasing Physical Activity and Independence Are Regarded as of Particular Significance.

A new freedom in physical movement is discernible in physical education in the little girls' play. Always they have had the most varied line of games and were fairly active, but nothing so unladylike as jumping over a stick, a sort of pole vault without the pole. Now this is not unusual in the larger towns, and surprisingly high do these wooden clogs, kimonoed, pig-tailed youngsters jump, and with much abandon.

In the girls' schools there is much more activity than even three years ago of the kind that past generations of American mothers called tomboyishness, and increasing interest in tennis and basketball. Also it is not becoming now for maiden or matron to hold up her head in line with her spine, and frankly look on at this world and all its incumbrances. Formerly it was almost the great unpardonable not to carry the head slightly forward, with eyes downcast. This attitude of humiliation is now becoming fearfully old-fashioned.

Foreign teachers of long experience say that the change in this respect is striking in the classroom. Students when reciting now look up squarely at the instructor instead of at their knees as formerly. As this is not a taught thing, but the reflex of a change within, vital enough to overcome teaching and inherited tendency, it is significant.

Another change, trifling, but a straw that shows the direction and velocity of the current, is the growing habit of man and wife to walk side by side on the street instead of my lady pigeon-tooting along about a pace in the rear of her lord.—Scribner's Magazine.

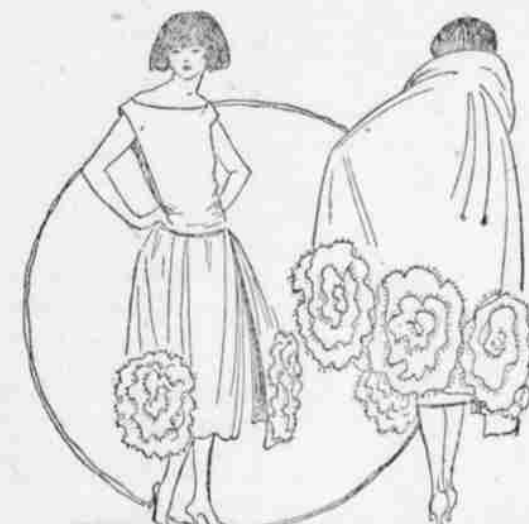
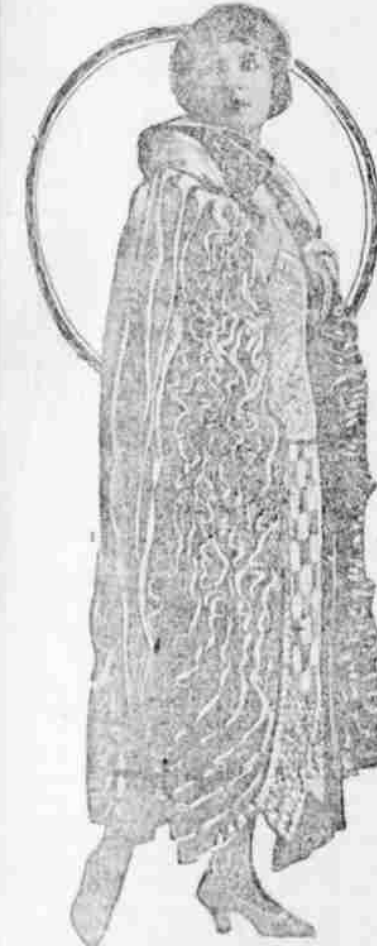
