CHAUTAQUA TO BE HERE JUNE 25

Program Includes Famous Lecturers and Interesting Musical Numbers

"CAPPY RICKS" IS PLAY

Best Musical Feature Not Yet Announced as Company is Endeavoring to Sign Up Well Known Artist For Concert Tour.

Roseburg's annual chautauqua will be here on the dates of June 24th to July 1st, inclusive, according to an announcement received today by the local guarantors from the Ellison-White Chautauqua company. The program this year is to be better than ever before the management asserts. It will contain lectures by Opie Read, the beloved writer and kindly philosopher, Norman Allan Imrie, a new figure on the chautauqua platform and Elmer Lynn Williams, Chicago's famous "fighting parson." For other entertainment there will be Paul Fleming, said to be the cleverest magician since Germaine; and for a play "Cappy Ricks" a well known comedy without a peer. For music there will be Gilvan Opera company, a vocal organization with the same standing in its field as the Little Symphony of last season; the Oceanic Quartette and other splendid attractions. The greatest musical feature is not yet definitely booked. Efforts are being made to sign up an artist, whose appearance with chautauqua will constitute an event in the history of that movement, and further information regarding this feature will be made when complete arrangements have been made.
