MIGRATORY WORKERS.

Roving around the country is a great body of men known as migratory workers. They harvest the crops in summer, do odd jobs in cities in the winter, shovel snow in northern localities, and as laborers are depended upon by many contractors for construction jobs. Many people of orderly and settled habits look at these people as mere wanderers. Many of them are spoken of as hoboes and vagrants. Yet these migratory folks resent the claim that they are idle and shiftless. They say they form the country's labor reserve, and business could not go on were they not ready to shift their powers in any direction where a special labor supply is needed. Many of them travel by "side door Pullmans," but that is the only way they could get to their destinations. The farmer in desperate need of harvest hands does not raise many questions how they get to his fields. The business of the country ought to be so organized that there would not be this fluctuating demand for help. It encourages people to live a roving life, if you hire them a few months through the busy season, and then set them adrift without thought of their future. A man who had developed wandering tendencies would develop a happy go lucky attitude toward life. He would always feel that he could get along somehow, and many of this class degenerate into regular vagrants. Their life is too irregular to allow them to support families, and their work encourages them to develop irresponsibility. If the farmers who employ these fellows in summer could encourage those who show industry to settle down in little cottages on their farms, lending them a little money to start little enterprises of their own, they could lead a lot of them to settle down and give up the sorrows and hardships and wanderlust of migratory life.

LAW BREAKING ALIENS.

The house of representatives at Washington a few days ago passed a law that would authorize deportation of aliens who have violated the narcotic drug or Volstead laws. This bill was denounced by a number of members as unreasonable and hypocritical. There will be a quite general feeling, though, that aliens who can't obey the laws of this country are not fit to remain here. Probably a majority of the people would not be so much disposed to vote against this proposition, as to feel that it should be the rule in many other offenses. A large part of the people who are involved in automobile accidents are said to be aliens. With little judgment and sense of other people's rights, they tear around the country and smash up themselves and others. A big share of the crooks and gunmen are known to be aliens. Formerly these foreigners used to come over here with a wholesome respect for American laws. They grew up in countries where there is less freedom than exists here, and they were respectful to public authority when they got on this side. But since the war conditions of chaos have existed in many parts of the world. The brutality of war and the general social disintegration have infected a lot of ignorant people. The aliens in the main are well meaning, but they have had little chance to understand American ideas and under wrong influences it is easy to lead them into wrong paths. When they set out to break American laws, they need some drastic treatment. If a few of them were deported for rum running and other offenses, it would have a wonderfully tonic effect on the conduct of others, who would conclude that American laws were meant to be obeyed.

The American people feel keenly interested in the effort of the Irish nation to exercise self-government. For centuries these people have been held in subjection, and it is not surprising that they are plunging wildly when they get their chance for freedom. But let it be hoped that they will refute the claim of enemies that they are unfit for self control. The test of whether a country should be free, is whether it can maintain stable government. The final trial comes when it attempts to hold orderly elections, and when the minority is called on to submit to the majority. When they hold an election in many South American countries, the defeated party gets out with guns and tries to overturn the results by force. The enemies of Ireland are expecting and perhaps hoping that this will happen in that island. But those who know her better have faith to hope that peaceable elections will be held in due time, and that the minority will prove its fitness for freedom by accepting the will of the majority.

Within the past year or two a great effort has been made in schools and health centers to have children acquire normal weight. This is a good idea, but it may be exaggerated. A recent writer in The Outlook takes the position that the condition of a child should be judged not merely on weight, but other factors must be considered. Many educators and physicians endorse this sentiment. A large number of children who are perfectly healthy are of a slender type. Nothing is gained by exaggerated efforts to fatten such ones. They may be made nervous about their physical condition by too much fussing over them.

DISCUSS PLANS FOR TAX REDUCTIONS

Too Many Commissions Is the General Belief of Representative Men.

INCOME TAX APPROVED

Millage Tax for Institutions of Higher Education Approved by Majority of Speakers Who Feel That Schools Should Be Maintained.

Eliminating and consolidating too numerous commissions, now a part of the state government, was the principle suggestion developed at the meeting held Saturday by representatives of the various organizations of the county, who met to consider methods of tax reduction. It was the general consensus of opinion that there are altogether too many commissions maintained by the state and that they constitute an expense

which should be eliminated or at least greatly reduced. Longer hours for public officials was also recommended and a reduction in the pay of some of the higher officials was also advised.

The meeting was called to order on Saturday afternoon by Arthur Marsh, who was elected permanent chairman, D. B. Bubar being chosen secretary. The meeting was then thrown open to general discussion and a number of pertinent topics considered. W. C. Edwards, of Drain, suggested that a graduated income tax should be adopted to relieve the tax burden. He also proposed the elimination of the millage tax for higher educational institutions.

This proposal aroused an argument, the millage tax being championed by R. A. Hercher, president of the farm bureau, who said that the state should not detract one iota from the standards of its schools but should do everything possible to make its schools the best in the land.

E. H. Churchill recommended that the public officers work longer hours, eliminating a number of clerks. He also advised that assessors be careful in assessing merchandise and that merchants pay on their stock. He also spoke in favor of the retention of the millage tax for the higher educational institutions.

A. C. Marsters suggested that all of the state expenses should be trimmed. He also struck at the commissions claiming that there are altogether too many in existence.

C. O. Garrett, of Glendale, favored abolishing several of the commissions and said that such a movement would undoubtedly participate a hard fight.

David Buschbark also stressed the fact that there are too many commissions, and endorsed the income tax movement.

After considerable discussion, in which many other speakers joined following out the various matters already mentioned, it was decided to empower the chairman to appoint a committee to meet with the tax commission when it arrives following the primary election. After consideration, Mr. Marsh appointed on this committee R. A. Hercher, C. O. Garrett, W. C. Edwards, J. W. Hamilton and George Neuner, Jr.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that on the 25th day of March, 1922, there was filed in the office of the undersigned an initiative petition requesting that a special election be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on May 19th, 1922, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said city the following proposed amendment to the existing Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, to-wit:

An Act to amend Section 22 of the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, by adding thereto Subdivision 56, to authorize the City of Roseburg to acquire certain lands hereinafter described for a City Park, providing for the issuance of not to exceed FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS in negotiable bonds of the City of Roseburg to provide funds for the acquisition of said lands, and providing for the levy of taxes to pay the interest on said bonds and to pay said bonds at maturity.

Be it enacted by the People of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, that Section 22 of the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, as amended by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, by "An Act to Incorporate the City of Roseburg, and to amend all acts and parts of acts in conflict therewith, to-wit: an act entitled "An Act to Incorporate the City of Roseburg," approved October 23rd, 1889, and "An Act to incorporate the City of Roseburg," approved February 23rd, 1889; also an act amendatory of said act, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 19th, 1891; and also an act to incorporate the City of Roseburg, and to define the powers thereof, approved February 19th, 1891; and to repeal all acts amendatory thereof and in conflict therewith" (which act was filed in the office of the Secretary of State in February, 1891, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1907, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1913, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1915, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1917, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1919, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 5th, 1921, shall be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Section 22, Subdivision 56, which shall read as follows, to-wit:

"The Common Council of the City of Roseburg is hereby given full power and authority and is hereby directed to purchase the following described real property, to-wit: All of Block 27, Subdivision 56, Addition to the City of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, according to the official plat thereof on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of said County, for a City Park, and to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Roseburg, the principal sum of which shall not exceed the sum of FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, for the purpose of providing funds for the acquisition of said lands. The bonds hereinafter authorized shall be in such form and of such denominations and payable as to principal at such times as the Council may determine, and shall not be subject to redemption until the time said bonds are acquired by the City of Roseburg, until said bonds are fully paid. The Council is hereby authorized to levy a tax annually in addition to all other taxes

The Council is hereby authorized to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Roseburg, the principal sum of which shall not exceed the sum of FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, for the purpose of providing funds for the acquisition of said lands. The bonds hereinafter authorized shall be in such form and of such denominations and payable as to principal at such times as the Council may determine, and shall not be subject to redemption until the time said bonds are acquired by the City of Roseburg, until said bonds are fully paid. The Council is hereby authorized to levy a tax annually in addition to all other taxes
