Swells' Pride.

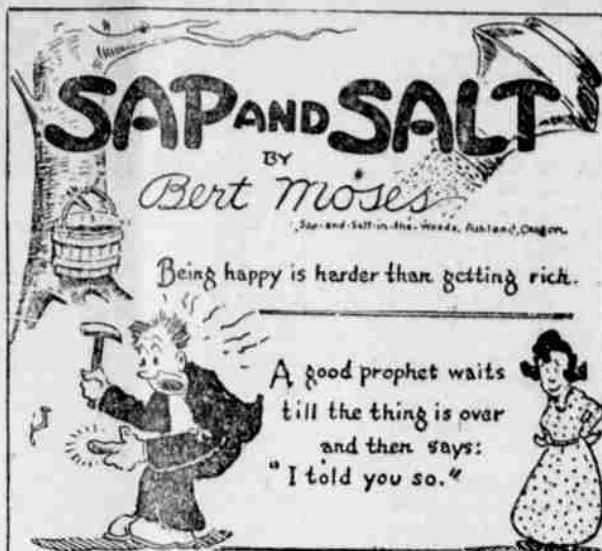

Missionary Speaks to Sunday School

Dr. E. V. Rutherford, of India, who was present at the services of the First Baptist Sabbath school Sunday morning gave the members a unique treat. Dr. Rutherford has been a missionary in India for fifteen years and has learned a great deal of their customs and beliefs, and speaks the dialect of the district in which he lives. He had with him some articles made by the natives as their household deity. Dr. Rutherford remarked that even though you might live in India for years you would probably never see one of these idols and that it was presented to him by one of the chiefs of a village who had become a Christian and discarded all such heathen worship. Probably the most interesting feature was the native Indian music which Dr. Rutherford was able to illustrate through the kindness of Dr. McKoon and Baldwin, who had placed a Brunswick phonograph in the church for his use. Dr. Rutherford had had some records made of the music of that far country and some were played. Probably no other records have ever been heard in Roseburg and Hasting. In this case we got an insight into the minds of the natives of India, with whom Dr. Rutherford is so well acquainted.
