



Did you ever try to make the famous Parker House Rolls? The Treat of the Evening

Here is a recipe easy to follow:
Just take

2 cups Milk
3 tablespoons Maida
About 2 1/2 cups Flour
2 Yeast Cakes
1/4 cup Karo (Crystal White)
1 1/2 teaspoons Salt
1/2 cup lukewarm Water
1/2 cup Kingsford's Corn Starch

Sold the milk. Pour into the mixing bowl, add Karo (Crystal White), salt and Maida. When lukewarm add the yeast dissolved in the warm water, and enough flour sifted with corn starch to make a thin batter. Beat thoroughly, cover, and rise till about double in bulk. Add enough flour to make a dough as soft as can be handled. Turn onto floured board, knead until spongy and elastic. Let it rise till triple in bulk. Turn onto a well-floured board and roll out lightly about half an inch thick. Cut with a biscuit cutter previously dipped in flour. Dip handle of a case knife in flour and with it make a crease through the middle of each piece. Brush over half of the top of each piece with Maida and press the edges together lightly. Place in a greased pan one inch apart. Cover, and let rise till light. Bake in a hot oven twelve to fifteen minutes.

Ku Klux Klan At- tends Revival

Yesterday was one of the great days in the history of the Christian church. The revival meeting brought great audiences. The day began with a big bible school, and although the goal set for attendance was not reached, the workers felt greatly encouraged over the large school. The morning service filled the house. It had been decided to hold the night service in the armory. Some thought there would not be as large a crowd as was present last Sunday night. The orchestra concert was set for 7 o'clock, and before that time the people were rolling in for choice seats. It was noticed by those coming in that one section was being reserved. This was a surprise to all, as even the pastor himself had not been informed of any special delegation. Only one usher really knew the situation. Directly the great congregation was surprised to see walking down the aisle a delegation from the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, dressed in full regalia. They were seated in the front, and the great audience began to cheer. Another surprise was soon sprung. When the pastor asked for the evening offering, the chief of the Klan came forward and presented Evangelist Ross with an envelope containing \$20 stating that it was in honor of his Americanism. The audience stood and sang American with all their force, and the old hall rang with the music. The concert preceding the regular service was a most pleasing one and the song service brought music from all the audience. The evangelist gave one of the greatest if not the greatest sermon he has delivered during the revival. He gave his sermon from a large chart, and it was entitled, "The Six Kingdoms," or "Where Do You Live?" He certainly showed the people just which kingdom they were in, and the sermon presented as it was had a telling effect. During the day eight people responded to the invitation to take a stand for the church, making a total of 32 who have thus far come forward. The revival will continue in the church each evening during this week. Tonight the evangelist has announced that he will pay his respects to the person who wrote an article and signed his name Free Thinker, and made an unkind attack on preachers and churches. If you want to bear this tirade answered, be present tonight. There has never been such great crowds in any Christian church revival during the present pastorate as are coming this time. Each evening the house is packed, and you cannot afford to miss it. The evangelist is also giving short talks and blackboard demonstrations of church history. Service begins tonight at 7:15 with an orchestra concert, to be followed by the sermon, "Soul Suicide."
