IMPROVING FACILITIES.

The advance of a community depends very largely on the business facilities which it offers. One function of the modern chamber of commerce and similar organizations is to see that its home city has such advantages comparing well with other cities of the same class. If it can provide facilities above the average it has a tremendous talking point.

The larger cities attach great importance to such efforts. They have service directors who devote their entire time to promoting the interests of those who are shipping freight. They work for better co-operation with freight and express companies, etc.

Facilities on which many chambers of commerce are working include the following: Water power, railroad side tracks, belt line railroads, better streets and roads, waterways, storage warehouses for agricultural products, and sewage disposal systems. The list could be indefinitely extended.

Every community has its needs in such directions. A number could be mentioned in which the business men of Roseburg should have improved facilities, though as a whole our community compares very favorably in such advantages with its neighbors.

There should be in every city and town some committee representing the business men, which is working actively on such propositions. It should not merely get together and lament the lack of this or that advantage. If a thing is possible to attain it should work persistently and spend time and effort impressing the idea on other people, and on those who have it in their power to grant the improvement. Where a city works in this persistent way for business advantages, it is pretty apt to get them.

The doctor who answers a hurry call with the greatest possible speed is more valuable than a physician of equal skill who drives up to the patient's door at his own convenience. Service counts. It is worth money. Who is there who doesn't agree with this general principle? And doesn't it apply also in the buying of merchandise? The progressive merchant in your own trading center gives service along with the goods. He has a selection of merchandise continually in stock. You don't have to wait. When you enter the store you are able to see the article itself in which you are interested. You see it with your eyes, feel it with your fingers; note its actual size, shape and color; compare it with other goods at different prices, and, if it is what you want, take it away with you. If you have questions to ask, you are given an explanation on the spot. The answer given your first question may suggest another query. It is answered within half a minute of the first interrogation. No time is lost. You benefit from the dealer's practical knowledge, from the fact that he is on the ground and ready at all times to see to it personally that the article he has sold you gives satisfaction. The wise buyer will not forget that such matters have a dollars and cents value and should enter into the reckoning whenever a price comparison is being made.—From The Oregon Farmer.

In these times when hours of labor have been reduced, people ought to have more time to make their places more attractive. One of the easiest ways of beautifying a home is to plant shrubbery around it. Once you get a bed of shrubs well started, they need little attention. A little spading, trimming, and perhaps fertilizing, and these sturdy and independent little bushes take care of themselves and ask no favors from anyone. At their own appointed time, every shrub in a well selected arrangement will burst forth into a rich mass of bloom. If correctly chosen, the bank of shrubbery should have some bloomers at every period in the season. It transforms a bare and cold looking dwelling into a cheerful center of radiance and beauty. Every home in Roseburg should be adorned with pretty shrubs.

Some communities seem to think that they have solved all problems when they get people to observe clean up days and have all their rubbish carted away from the homes. And frequently this same rubbish is deposited along one of the principal roads, where the unsightly mess is seen and commented upon unfavorably by every motor party that enters the town. Often such stuff is dumped in some low place, not suitable for building. But there may have been natural growth there that constituted a pretty tangle and it had its own wild beauty. When you turn such a conspicuous spot into an ash and tin can heap, you create a nuisance. Public dumps should be located away from the main streets and ought to be screened from public view by quick growing trees or otherwise.

The present campaign is not looking in the way of pre-election promises. If the present willingness to keep taxes down is carried into execution your annual tax receipt will look like the proverbial thirty cents—so will the average community.

No candidate has so far expressed his faith in radio messages. This will be an after campaign thought when the results begin to pour in.

Salvation Army Work Advancing

(By ENVOY E. L. GRAVES.)

The purpose of the Salvation Army can best be expressed by the motto of the organization: "The World for Christ and Christ for the World." As well as by the charge given by its founder to "Go for Souls and Go for the Worst." Touched by the awful conditions of the masses of darkest England, and later of all lands, General Booth believed the Salvation of God to be the only panacea for existing conditions.

The results accomplished during the intervening years justify the claims of the Army that the solution of present social and industrial evils is to be found in the application of the principles advocated by the lowly Nazarene, which is that, loving God, and second, loving your neighbor.

The spread and growth of the Salvation Army since its inception in 1865 has been nothing short of miraculous. From the lonely figure standing on Miles end waste in London, dedicating his life to God and the saving of mankind, it has spread to all the corners of the world.

Without previous plans, men and women touched by the same spirit, but moving from England to their parts of the world, continued their service for others, thus planting the Army's flag. It was the Shirley family of London, having settled in the city of brotherly love, who started the Salvation Army work in the United States, in a deserted chair factory, and who finally induced General Booth to send a small party of his officers to officially open the work on this side of the Atlantic. The start of this work on other continents was accomplished in similar ways.

The Salvation Army operates today in 72 countries and colonies and preaches the Gospel in 42 different languages in U. S. A. It works in 11,000 different cities and has more than 18,000 commissioned officers in its ranks. Truly, it can be said that the sun never sets on the Salvation Army.

It should be borne in mind in considering the growth of the Salvation Army, that it was accomplished in the face of much and serious persecution. The privileges enjoyed today by the Salvation Army, of preaching on
