JUST ONE-HALF YARD



How about the half-yard of material that was left over from your own cotton dress? Probably it hasn't occurred to you that it would make Louise's apron. The little girl above is wearing one of yellow percale, bound with blue chambray and with a big blue tulip for a pocket. It's cut from just one-half yard of thirty-six inch goods on the crosswise, including front, back, belts and all.

Cutting, Fig. 1, shows how to cut the apron for a little five-year-old girl. From A to B is eighteen inches; from B to C, five inches; from C to G, two inches; from G to H, three inches; from B to D, four inches; and from F to B, one inch. Mark the square outline for the neck as lines B-D, D-H and E-C; then drop one inch in the front to point F. In cutting out the neck, curve the corners, as in Fig. 2. Cut off the material from G to H and use it for the belts.

COPPER MINE IS VALUABLE

J. A. Becker, who has been experimenting with a new process for extracting copper from ore, was in Roseburg today showing a bar of copper taken from the Silver Peak mine near Riddle. This mine is on the property owned by Frain Cain and operated by the Oregon Exploration company, Inc. Mr. Becker took about 7 1/2 pounds of copper from 55 pounds of ore, using a crude apparatus. The mine is quite a valuable piece of property, his tests have proven.
