Epworth Convention Closes

The Epworth League convention which closed Sunday evening at the First Methodist church was a success in every particular. The ministers present were all agreed that they had never attended a gathering of Christian young people which would result in more lasting good. And the young people themselves were enthusiastic over the reports of progress in the different leagues, and in the "Followship Service" Sunday afternoon they gave expression to their hearty appreciation of the great address and inspiring music. The largest furnished by the Ladies Aid society was a delight to all present. It was both simple and artistic. Saturday afternoon as about 200 leagues marched through the streets giving their yells, it seemed like some of those had suddenly dropped in to Roseburg. A young man who is not a member of any church was heard to say: "I never knew that church people had such good times and as much pep." Many followed the procession across the swinging bridge, and down to the river bank where forty pounds of oranges and several hundred buns were disposed of.

The closing session by Rev. J. M. Walters, D. D., of Eugene, was an eloquent appeal for "The Real Life." He showed how the curse of God automatically followed "the sham" in every phase of existence. He inspired those who plead poverty when God's church is appealing for money and yet have the cash for gasoline and new tires. "A new tire a year would more than support the church." "Larger living a life always comes back as a boomerang on the offender." "Christian living, not pruned orchards, will save our city and country."

The service closed as league conventions usually do by forming a circle around the walls of the auditorium and Sunday school hall. They clasped hands, making an unbroken circle, and sang "Bless Be the Tie That Binds." Next year the convention goes to Eugene, and the new president is Rev. S. J. Channy of Klamath Falls.

Miss Fay Goshaw, of Roseburg, was elected as one of the vice presidents, and a similar honor went to Miss Nora Walker of Ellensburg, who is attending the high school in Roseburg. Complimentary resolutions were passed concerning the splendid hospitality of the citizens of Roseburg in entertaining the convention and of the tireless efforts of Miss Gladys Walker and her committee in trying to make everyone comfortable during their stay among us.

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Reedsport Officers Seize Still

REEDSPORT, Or., April 21.—Another large still was captured today by Constable F. C. Schulte and Deputy Jack Connelly, on Gus Johnson's ranch, about ten miles from Reedsport.

This was the famous Bill Burnett distillery which the officers have been seeking for some time. It has been known that this still has been in operation for several months, but its location was not discovered until today. It was generally supposed that Burnett's still was a short distance up Smith river, as evidence such as empty mash barrels and other paraphernalia of a distillery were found there. This was probably his first place of operation but since moving up the Umpqua it has been used as a blind to throw the officers off his track.

The still, which is one of the most up-to-date, was set up in an especially arranged building about 12-24 feet, and was situated about 100 feet from the Johnson ranch house. It is about five feet long, two feet wide, and two feet high, and has a capacity of about one hundred gallons. Over two openings in the top are placed condensers from each of which extended two coils. A large saw plate in the top was used for filling and a three inch outlet at the bottom allowed the waste mash to pass off. It was set up over a brick furnace, and wood was used for heat. About four hundred gallons of mash were found.

The officers left town about 3:30 in the morning of the 21st of the capture and took a position on a hill from which they could see all that was going on without being seen. After watching for about seven hours, they decided that the still was actually running and that the owner could be taken red-handed, so they descended the hill, stepped in the door and caught Burnett in the act of firing the still. After dismantling the plant they prepared it for shipment to Reedsport.

Burnett and Johnson were brought before Justice of the Peace R. V. Kleib, but were released so that federal charges could be filed against them before U. S. Commissioner W. C. Benson.

This is the second largest still to be seized in the state of Oregon, according to reports of federal officers. The largest one was also taken near Reedsport by Officers Schulte and Connelly about a month ago. These officers have made quite a record, having taken six stills in the last few months. They say that Kentucky and Tennessee have nothing on Reedsport.
