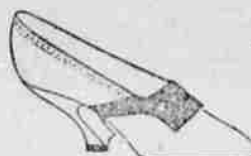

HERE WITH AFGHAN BEAUTY

Red-Haired Huntress Arrives From Asia in Company of Retired British Army Officer.

When the White Star liner Adriatic arrived here recently from a tour of Mediterranean ports there was on board one Percival M. Fielding, a retired army captain of London, and Tazidah the beautiful, said a recent issue of the New York Tribune.

It was in the hills of Afghanistan that the captain first met Tazidah. She was chasing a gazelle over the snow-covered hills. Her red hair streamed behind her in the breeze. Her easy grace attracted the attention of the captain.

Later he came to know her better. He gave her sweetmeats. From that time on they were inseparable. Before long it was a common sight at the inn to see the captain smoking his pipe with one hand and stroking Tazidah's lovely red hair with the other. When the captain left the hills of Afghanistan Tazidah went with him.

Her feet were of invaluable service to her in pursuing gazelles. Being as they were, big and flat, they acted as snowshoes. They had been big from the day of her birth, and were looked upon by her countrymen as a rare inheritance.

Tazidah stood on deck, rejoicing in the sloppy weather. To be sure, the snow was more diluted than that to which she had been accustomed. But it was snow, and that was the main thing. She yearned for the sight of a gazelle.

Water 30 Cents a Gallon.

The nearest watering place is 11 miles away. For five miles the water is carried in a buckboard drawn by horses. Then the road narrows to a trail and horses are unhitched, the water bags tied over their backs, and the remainder of the trip is slow. It takes about a day to make the trip.

STAGE SET FOR R. H. S. OPERETTA

"The Bells Of Beaujolais" to Be Presented by Students at Antlers Tonight.

PLOT IS VERY UNIQUE

Flirtation Between American Tourists and Girls of Beaujolais Leads To Many Humorous and Mirth-Producing Situations.

Since the time that Nero fiddled "A Hot Time in Our Town" at the burning of Rome there has never been presented a play featuring music which has so delighted, excited, thrilled and amused an audience as will the high school glee club operetta to be presented at the Antlers theatre tonight. For months the cast, under the able direction of Miss Madge Calkins and Miss Rosa Parrott, has been bending every effort to make the play stand out from the background and make people who attend feel that they have got double money's worth.

The play selected for presentation tonight is entitled "The Bells of Beaujolais," and stands by itself in the world of operetta. Two very noted artists are responsible for the play. They are David Stevens, who wrote the libretto, and Louis Adolphe Caenno, who wrote the music. Anyone who has seen or heard the work of these men will agree that they are masters in their line. The manuscript comes direct from the publishers and is therefore a very new play.

The plot deals with the experiences of an American expedition party who visit the imaginary shores of Beaujolais and the many humorous situations caused by the affection of the men members of the party for the fair damsels of the little hamlet. Throughout there is a line of humor that keeps the crowd in an incessant uproar of laughter. Beautiful costumes and stage settings give the music support in making the play what might be characterized as a "humorously beautiful" turn.

The play is in two acts. The first gives the scenes connected with the annual spring festival which is in progress in the little village and gives a picture of the life of the imaginary island hamlet. All the sparkle and life of the celebration will be ably portrayed on the stage. The second act shows a public garden party in progress in the castle Beaujolais. The guests, peasants, natives, dukes, duchesses and visiting Americans all have their own ideas about proper costume and carry out their ideas with great effect.

The cast selected from the glee club have proven themselves to be very capable in plays of various sorts and again, and will be at their best tonight.

Allen Hewitt, who takes the part of Duke Augustus, has participated in a number of plays and has become very proficient in histrionic activities. Mr. Hewitt delighted those who attended last year's operetta in portraying the part of a Chinese nobleman, and will do likewise tonight.

LaVerne Hawn, who takes the part of John Bender, will be remembered as the leading character in the junior play given last year in which he very aptly portrayed the part of Professor Papp in the play of that name. Mr. Hawn's vocal ability will stand him in good stead tonight when he sings with the island beauties.

Harold Roadman and Harold Bennett, taking the parts of two vivacious young Americans, Tony and Larry, show much ability in flirting with the very attractive native girls, Susette and Yvonne. Evelyn Quine takes the part of Yvonne, and carries it in a convincing fashion. Carmel Atterbury very cleverly portrays the part of Susette. These four characters have also had lots of experience in plays and will show no weaknesses at tonight's performance.

Harkins, the English butler is made to live and learn by his portrayer, James Pickens. Harkins finds undeniable charms in Fantine, the capable maid to the Countess. The part of Fantine is very brilliantly carried through by Vivian Orcutt, whose voice will delight the whole audience.

The part of Countess Marie, the betrothed of the Duke, is taken by Mary Reams, who has many times proven herself to be a splendid actress.

Aunt Sarah, who finds life full of hardships in taking care of her young charges, Phillis and Belle, is made real by the splendid acting of Grace Wickham. The parts of Phillis and Belle are taken by Elva Westcott and Gertrude Wickham. The Wickham sisters have more than once delighted Roseburg people by their beautiful solos and duets, and will tonight do the same again.

The parts of Chloet and Pierre are taken by Charles Thurston and Eugene Bowden, who cause the audience an unending series of laughs.

Minor parts, such as the villagers and natives, are taken by the other members of the glee club. The choruses sung by the club are in themselves worth the price of admission.

Miss Dorothy Gordon, well known pianist of this city, will accompany the play.

A school children's matinee was given this afternoon and the regular performance will begin promptly at 8:15 tonight. Many seats have already been reserved, but many good seats are yet available. Prices without reservations are 35, 50 and 75 cents. Those desiring good seats are urged to get there early in order to make reservations and enjoy

the show to the best advantage.

The high school orchestra will play before the show and between acts. The syncopators have a number of new pieces rehearsed and are anxious to show Roseburg their ability as musicians.

STUCK TO HIS RESOLUTION

Story Reveals Firmness of Character of the Great Japanese Statesman, Marquis Okuma.

The late Marquis Okuma of Japan, while talking with a group of politicians shortly before his death, was asked by one of them who, in his opinion, was the most dreadful man in the world, and his reply was: "One from whom you have received favors." The great statesman of Waseda, when young, was never able to excel in handwriting, try as he might, though he was remarkably good at brain work. Ashamed of this, with characteristic stubbornness he determined that he would never again take up a brush to write. Once Keiu Nakamura, prominent scholar of Chinese literature, to try this resolution of Okuma's, called a boy and said, "Go and ask Okuma how to write the Chinese character 'Shoku'." The boy came up to Okuma and did as he was told. To help him Okuma took out brush and ink and a sheet of paper, and he almost began setting the letter down, when he suddenly recollected his resolution.

Immediately he dropped his brush on the floor, took the boy near the fire and showed him how to write the character in the ashes with a poker.

Money in Street Music.

Never were so many bands in London streets as now. Some are, or supposed to be, formed of unemployed; others, perhaps, spring from a pure desire to make our lives melodious. This music seems to be profitable. At Marlborough Street police court a member of a street band charged with obstruction was said to be making more than £7 (\$35) a week. From a Musicians' union comes the comment that this is no uncommon sum; and that street musicians have been known to refuse places in a theater orchestra.
