Long Distance Radio Message Received

Operating on a very crude aerial, a piece of wire suspended by two boards about eight feet high, the News-Review radio receiving set was given a test yesterday afternoon. High powered radio stations were received with the greatest distinctness and Operator O. W. Lee, a first class wireless operator who has had charge of the installation of the News-Review set, copied code messages from San Francisco, commercial messages from Honolulu to Portland and listened to many boat and land stations along the coast. The signals came in with unusual distinctness and were easily copied. Because of the interference set up in the crude antenna, short wave signals were not easily received and it will be impossible to handle concerts with any degree of satisfaction until the large aerial is completed.

This work has been held up by the lack of materials, the workmen finding it impossible to secure guy wire insulators. Two fifty foot poles are being erected for this aerial and because of the strain it is necessary to use a heavy type of insulator. The great demand for radio supplies has made it quite difficult to get these insulators and consequently there has been considerable delay. It is hoped to secure them soon and when they arrive it will take only a few hours to have the aerial ready for use as all leads and switches have been installed and everything is in readiness to connect up. The set performs in a very satisfactory manner and it is expected that it will be ready for use in furnishing public entertainment within a few days.
