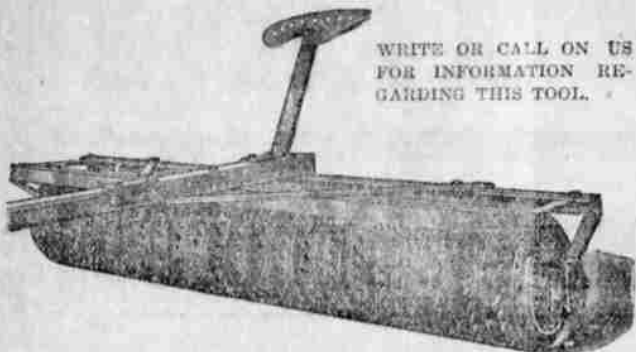

This notice is served upon all creditors of said estate and all persons interested therein by publication for ten days prior to said sale in the Roseburg News-Review.

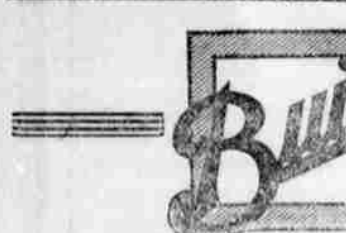
