

Identity of "Lost Boy" Puzzling to Police, Who Appeal for Public Help

Flaxen-Haired Youth Claims He Has "Two Mammams and Daddies."

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 29.—Police here are in a desperate effort to answer the question of the identity of a flaxen-haired youth who claims to have two mothers and two fathers.

The "lost boy" is the four-year-old youngster who was found in a doorway here last week. He claims to have two mothers and two fathers. He is a white child, with flaxen hair, and is about four years old.

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BOY TELLS STORY.

Seated on his bed in the Kansas City detention home, the flaxen-haired youngster dictated for the International News Service his own story:

By "Harry Wilson,"

"Lost Boy of Mystery."

"I don't know who I am, or who my mammams or daddies are. I've got two of each. One of them called me 'Harry Wilson.' That was the last daddy and mamma I had."

"I used to have another daddy who called me 'Buster.'"

"I don't know who he was, but he was an awful, awful nice daddy. He had an automobile. My other mamma was awful, awful nice, too."

"I came to this town in a train. It was from a long way off."

"Sometimes somebody used to call me 'Johnny Taylor.' I don't know who called me that."

"I have a brother who used to live with my first daddy, and his name was Roy. I have a sister who lived with Roy, but I don't know her name."

"I will not go away with my second mamma and daddy, for I do not like them. I like my first mamma best."
